OUTSIDE ORGANIZATION REPORTS

Jennifer Ingram with Veterans Assistance of Iroquois County went over her claims, awards and budget. She stated fiscal year 2021 has seen 165 active claims for compensation or pension. There is a total of 241 active claims that have not been decided with a carryover of 76 from previous years. This is up from 137 total claims last year. For fiscal year 2021 there have been awards totaling \$1,222,615.05 which is more than last year by \$164,544.30.

Angel Crawford, Executive Director of IEDA will be hosting an informational meeting in January to talk about the Advantage Illinois Plan through the Illinois Department of Commerce Office of Business Development, which was established in 2012 and was part of the Small Business Jobs Act of 2010. Funding from this program may be used for many purposes, including but not limited to start-up costs, working capital, business procurement, franchise fees, equipment, and inventory.

POLICY & PROCEDURE

Chairman Shure gave the report of the Policy and Procedure Committee. At this time, Mr. Zumwalt questioned the need to pass a Raffles and Poker Run Ordinance. It was noted that a law was passed in 2015 requiring jurisdictions to establish an Ordinance should they allow Raffles and Poker Runs to be held within the area of their control. Many Board members felt it was nonsense that this type of Ordinance was required by law, given the fact that raffles and poker runs are fundraising types of events. Chairman Shure confirmed that approval of the minutes was not passing an ordinance, it is merely giving direction to the State’s Attorney. It was moved by Chairman Shure to approve the Policy & Procedure Committee report. The motion was seconded and carried by a roll call vote.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on December 2, 2021 at 9:00 A.M. Members present were County Board Chairman John Shure, Charlie Alt, Roger Bard Barbara Offill and Joe Young. Lyle Behrends and Michael McTaggart were absent. Also present County Clerk Breein Suver, County Engineer Joel Moore, Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler and Treasurer Kurt Albers.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Joe Young and seconded by Charlie Alt to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a roll call vote.

There were no public comments.

The Committee Chairs gave their monthly reports:

- Tax/Planning & Zoning Chairman Roger Bard reported the committee will hear their standard reports. There are also two kennel licenses to review and take action on.
- Health Chairman Barbara Offill reported the committee will hear their regular reports from the health department and animal control.
- I.T. Chairman Joe Young reported an update will be given on the Courthouse phone installation.
- Highway Chairman Charlie Alt and County Engineer Joel Moore reported the Highway Committee will take action on a petition for county aid for a bridge in Loda Township. Also, a resolution for the County Engineer's annual salary will be reviewed and voted on.

County Board Chairman John Shure informed the committee he is preparing a revised committee assignment list. The list should be complete by the December 14th County Board meeting. The listing will show a reduction in meeting sizes in anticipation of the reduced County Board members in the next year. Also, the Finance Committee and the I.T. Committee will be combined.

An update was given on sexual harassment training. Overall completion is at 95%. The majority of those not completing the training are County Board members and part-time employees.

Shure discussed Senate Bill 536, which was signed by the Governor on November 15th and encompasses many election items. County Boards have until December 31st to complete their reapportionment before a County apportionment commission is required to be convened. Shure noted this is already completed. Also, County Boards are now required to divide their election precincts so that each precinct shall contain as near as may be practicable, 1200 registered voters.

The General Assembly is also requiring the County Board to change the boundaries at a regular or special meeting within 60 days after the effective date of this amendatory act. Shure said he has discussed these items with County Clerk Breein Suver and she believes the precincts and boundaries we currently have are in agreement with this legislation. Suver added the only precincts she feels would be beneficial in combining can't be done because we are under township organization. Suver can prepare a resolution that indicates what all of the polling places would be but this doesn't have to be acted on until January.

Discussion was held on establishing an ordinance covering raffles and poker runs. Suver noted the committee needs to determine a fee and the length of time for the license. Young stated he would prefer a small amount due to the fact that most money made from these events is charity based. It was moved by Offill and seconded by Young to request State's Attorney Jim Devine prepare an ordinance allowing Iroquois County to charge a \$5 application fee for raffles and poker runs. The application fee will run concurrently with the liquor licenses and will be effective for one year. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

It was moved by Offill and seconded by Bard to enter into executive session at 9:42 A.M. under 5 ILCS 120/2/c1: The appointment, employment, compensation, discipline, performance, or dismissal of specific employees of the public body. Motion carried by a voice vote.

It was moved by Offill and seconded by Young to come out of executive session at 10:18 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

It was moved by Young and seconded by Offill to create the position of Zoning Administrator and refer to the Finance Committee with input from Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Appointments include Dan Rayman being reappointed to the Zoning Board of Appeals for a five year term. Shure is also looking for a member to serve on the ETSB board and Yergler is looking for 2 members to serve on the Zoning Board of Appeals. Shure said there is a need to somehow broadcast these vacant positions.

Correspondence was distributed to the committee.

There was no old business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Young and seconded by Offill to adjourn at 10:26 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on December 6, 2021 at 9:00 A.M. Members present Lyle Behrends, Charlie Alt, Paul Bowers and Paul Ducat. Kevin Bohlmann, Sherry Johnson and John Zumwalt were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake and Sally Allhands.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Paul Bowers and seconded by Paul Ducat to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

During public comments, Sally Allhands introduced herself to the committee. Ms. Allhands is the daughter of the Phyllis Jameson, former Iroquois County Coroner and former Iroquois County board member. Upon noticing the trees that were removed at the Courthouse, the Allhands family would like to plant new trees along with a plaque to memorialize Ms. Jameson. It was moved by Bowers and seconded by Ducat to allow the Allhands family to plant trees and place a plaque at the Courthouse in memory of Phyllis Jameson, former Iroquois County Coroner and former Iroquois County Board member. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake's report included the following:

- Drake reviewed his FY21 budget line items with the committee.
- The issue with the leak in the chiller has been resolved.
- Drake spoke to the committee about a trade proposal with McCullough Implement. This includes trading the John Deere tractor from the Maintenance Department for a 6 foot snow pusher with a pullback kit, tires and rims for the skid steer from the Highway Department. The snow pusher is valued at \$1,500; the pullback kit is valued at \$500; and the tires and rims are valued at \$1,000. McCullough Implement guaranteed \$3,000 for the John Deere tractor but intends to sell it at a higher price. Anything over the \$3,000 trade guarantee price will be remitted to the County, less

their 15% commission. It was moved by Ducat and seconded by Charlie Alt to accept the trade proposal from McCullough Implement. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

- Freezer purchased for Jail kitchen.
- Per Sheriff Clint Perzee, Drake is constructing an interview room in the Jail. Alt requested Perzee inform the committee of any improvements to the Jail.
- Drake purchase a second snow blower, one for Administrative Center and one for Courthouse. Ducat suggested Drake get prices on an enclosure for the skid steer.

The County Farm was discussed. The crop is off but it is unsure if the soil has been tested. Tile has also been budgeted for 2022.

Discussion was held on bidding out contractors for an Animal Control building. Drake stated the area has been marked by Joint Utility Locating Information for Excavators (J.U.L.I.E.). The bidding process consists of advertising on the County's website and local newspapers. Finance Manager Jill Johnson will also send bid packets to the two contractors she has been in contact with. Alt stated the committee should have the opportunity to review the bid packet prior to putting it out for bid. Johnson will have the bid packet prepared for the board meeting on December 14th. It was moved by Lyle Behrends and seconded by Alt to develop and send bid packets for the Animal Control building, pending approval of the County Board. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Bowers and seconded by Ducat to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

During old business, Drake noted one of the capital improvement projects for the Administrative Center is the renovation of the old Head Start into an employee breakroom and bathroom. The project will need to be put out for bid and is budgeted at approximately \$30,000. Drake recommended the committee view the area to get a better understanding of the project. Also, the kitchenette will be a lactation room.

The committee recessed at 9:45 A.M. to view the area being renovated. The committee came back into session at 10:03 A.M.

It was moved by Ducat and seconded by Bower to request Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake develop a bid packet for the restroom and breakroom remodel and to put the project out for bid. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There was no new business.

Your committee met at the Administrative Center on December 7, 2021 at 9:00 A.M. Members present were Barbara Offill, Roger Bard, Ernie Curtis and John Zumwalt. Kevin Coughenour and Thomas Lynch were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson and ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by John Zumwalt and seconded by Ernie Curtis to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Roger Bard and seconded by John Zumwalt to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

During public comments, County Board Chairman John Shure took a moment to acknowledge Pearl Harbor Day, noting that today is the 80th anniversary of one of the most significant days in the history of our Country.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson reported there are currently 3 dogs in foster care. Open cases include a noise/barking complaint and a dog on dog attack which involved the owner being injured while trying to intervene. Both cases are being handled by the State's Attorney's Office. The Animal Control Officers closed 8 cases during the month. There were 7 animal bites, 2 of which were cat bites. The registration deposit for November was \$8,730. Johnson is currently preparing a bid packet for the animal control building. Johnson is also working on the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) application for the building. The Animal Control Officers took their humane investigator class through the Illinois Department of Agriculture last week. Johnson is awaiting their test results. County ID's were printed for the officers to carry with them while on calls. Lastly, Johnson said an initial kennel check has been done on 7 of the 11 existing kennels. This is something that should be done annually going forward. The remaining kennel checks will be completed this month.

ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert updated the committee on COVID-19, stating there has been a tremendous increase in cases. Schippert reported the following statistics:

- 192 new cases last week
- 4,804 cases to date
- 81 individuals have passed away with COVID-19
- Currently, 43.56% of the total population in Iroquois County is vaccinated
- Ages 5-11: 3.9%
- Ages 12-17: 27.18%
- Ages 18-64: 48%
- Ages 65 +: 77.28%

Schippert noted the delta variant is predominant in the cases the health department has seen. While vaccinated individuals can still get COVID-19, their symptoms are not near as strong as those that are unvaccinated. Boosters are being given to everyone and there is an expectation to not feel well after receiving the booster. Schippert stressed that the COVID-19 vaccine is not a live virus vaccine and you cannot get the virus from the vaccine.

The contact tracing grant ends this month but has been extended through March 30, 2022 and it is being overlapped with another grant that will be available January 17, 2022. Each County is being allocated an amount to continue contact tracing that will be retroactive to January 1, 2022 and will go through June 30, 2023. The mass vaccination grant that was supposed to end December 30, 2021 has been extended and amended to go through December 2022. Schippert explained the grant funds are being used for staff overtime and groceries for those that are isolated or quarantined.

Schippert reviewed the summary report of programs for FY2021 with the committee. Environmental Health performed 403 food inspections, 34 reinspections, issued 200 permits and 74 temporary permits. There were 201 water sample kits tested. Also, 46 new well inspections were performed, 14 non-community well surveys, issued 45 permits for new wells, issued 39 permits for sealed wells and performed 27 inspections for sealed wells. Environmental Health completed 37 private sewage inspections and performed inspections on 43 garbage waste haulers. There were 234 mosquito samples collected for west nile surveillance. There were 457 tobacco compliance inspections for the year. Immunizations include 887 childhood immunizations, 65 adult immunizations, 401 flu shots, 11 pneumonia shots and 14,169 COVID-19 vaccinations. For FY2021, 51 animal bites were reported and 28 rabies cases were investigated. In the Tuberculosis Program, there were 3 new cases investigated with 4 patients on medication. The Jail Program included an assessment of 107 inmates during the fiscal year. Vision screenings were provided for 2,110 children and hearing screenings were provided for 2,559 children. Senior Services is providing care for 188 individuals.

Lastly, Schippert discussed the Emergency Senior Services Grant that was approved. The grant is for individuals ages 60 and older that will allow them to remain in their homes by assisting with items such as groceries and medical needs.

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Zumwalt and seconded by Bard to adjourn at 9:35 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Mr. Bard, Chairman of the Tax/Planning & Zoning Committee, gave the report of his committee presented Resolutions R2021-45 & R2021-46 for approval. The Board discussed the kennel application for Paulette Waltz. Mrs. Offill voiced concerns about the type of dog and the possible number of puppies that could be produced from the kennel as planned. She was also concerned about the screening process as talked about in the Tax Committee meeting and thought there should be discussion on the application. She asked for more information from Ms. Waltz on her plans for the breeding and screening process. Ms. Waltz explained she has a screening page for potential adoptive clients with several questions such as knowledge of the breed and size of the amenities of the adoptive family. She wants to ensure that they are going to good homes and has a clause in her contract that would require the adoptive family to return the dog to Ms. Waltz, should there be any issues with the animal once it has been adopted. There was also some discussion regarding the pavers that have been used in the kennels. Ms. Waltz explained that she will have concrete poured, but at this time there are concrete pavers used in the kennels. After further discussion, it was moved by Mrs. Offill and seconded to remove from the report for separate consideration, the paragraph that refers to the kennel application for Paulette Waltz. The motion carried by a roll call vote.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on December 7, 2021 at 9:40 A.M. Members present were Roger Bard, John Zumwalt, Ernie Curtis and Barbara Offill. Kevin Coughenour and Thomas Lynch were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Treasurer Kurt Albers, County Clerk Breein Suver, Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler, ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert, Paulette Waltz, Mike Danielewski and Margaret Fox.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Barbara Offill and seconded by John Zumwalt to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Offill and seconded by Zumwalt to pay the claims subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There were no public comments.

The department heads gave their monthly reports:

- County Clerk Breein Suver reported a zoom meeting was held last Thursday with all County Clerks and the State Board of Elections regarding changes to election laws that are happening for the 2022 election cycle. Suver said she wanted to make the committee members aware as she believes this is something that will cause confusion for registered voters and will also be a large expense. Suver explained that before the primary election, the County Clerk's Office is required to send a letter out to every registered voter regarding their ability to sign up for a permanent vote by mail list. Signing up is optional but the County Clerk's Office is required by law to mail the letters out. If a voter signs up for a permanent vote by mail list, they will still be required to sign an application to vote but it will trigger the County Clerk's Office to mail an application for the ballot for future elections. Suver continued that once the primary election is over and before the general election, any registered voter that didn't sign up for the permanent vote by mail list will receive an additional letter from the County Clerk's Office informing them of their ability to sign up for the permanent vote by mail list. Suver also reported the statements of economic interest forms for 2022 have changed considerably and advised everyone to pay close attention to the forms when filling them out. Taxing bodies are continuing to file their budgets and levies. Drainage levies should be in by the end of the month. Lastly, the primary election is June 28, 2022. Petition circulation will begin on January 13, 2022. Filing will be March 7, 2022 through March 14, 2022.
- County Treasurer Kurt Albers reported the final tax distribution was completed last month. Most taxing bodies have received their tax distributions. There are a few tax distributions that are being held due to the Treasurer's Office not receiving the taxing bodies published reports, as required by law.

- Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler reported Board of Review complaint period ended December 3rd. They are preparing tentative decisions and final hearings will be held.

- Zoning Board of Appeals – November 30, 2021: Paulette Waltz applied to acquire a kennel license located in Section 33, Beaver Township, 28N, R 11W of Second P.M. The Permanent Identification Number is 13-33-300-006. The tract is located at 2430 N 2700 East Rd, Donovan, IL 60931.

(The following paragraph was removed from the report for separate consideration per action taken by the full County Board at the December 14, 2021 Recessed Session County Board meeting.)

Ms. Waltz addressed the committee about her application for a kennel license to breed great danes. Ms. Waltz explained she has a 12 x 24 Morton building that is heated and insulated. There are four 5 x 5 kennels inside with attached outside dog runs that are 5 x 10. Ms. Waltz plans to have one male, four adult breeding females and four puppies to raise for when the adults retire. Covers have been installed above the dog runs. The ground for the dog runs consist of concrete pavers with gravel underneath but will eventually put concrete in. Pictures of the kennel was provided to the committee. In regards to drainage, Ms. Waltz said there is a septic system particularly for animal waste that has been installed. The system requires enzymes be added to break down the animal waste. Tax/Zoning chairman Roger Bard verified with ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert that this is acceptable. Schippert said she would verify the process with Director of Environmental Health Ryan Wheeler but the health department does not regulate animal waste, only human waste. If the kennel has a handwashing sink, which Ms. Waltz confirmed it does not, then it would need to be tied to a septic system. Ms. Waltz successfully had one litter this summer and believes she will have another litter in January. The maximum number of dogs in the kennel is twelve with the intent of six litters each year. It was moved by Zumwalt and seconded by Offill to approve the kennel application for Paulette Waltz. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

The kennel application and setback variance for ICare was discussed. Mike Danielewski spoke on behalf of ICare stating Director of Environmental Health Ryan Wheeler has completed the inspection on their septic system. Also, a meeting was held with State's Attorney Jim Devine and County Board Chairman John Shure regarding the criminal charges against Margaret Fox. Margaret Fox with ICare explained the shelter is a 501c3 non-profit. The shelter operates with approximately 50 local volunteers. The typical intake cost for a dog is between \$1,500 to \$3,000. These costs are covered by donations. The cost to adopt a dog is \$200. A thorough background check is completed along with a home visit. It was moved by Offill and seconded by Ernie Curtis

to approve the kennel application and setback variance for ICare. Ms. Fox invited the committee to tour their new facility. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Discussion on building permit enforcement fines and penalties was tabled until the next meeting.

Discussion on publication of rural homesteads was tabled until the next meeting.

Suver presented a monthly resolution list showing two parcels being sold by the County trustee. Both parcels are located in Middleport Township. The parcels were sold at the base price and the County will be receiving \$704. It was moved by Zumwalt and seconded by Offill to approve the resolutions authorizing the sale of properties located in Middleport Township. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There was no old business.

Your Committee met at the Courthouse on December 8, 2021 at 3:00 P.M. Members present were Lyle Behrends, Paul Ducat, Roger Bard, Steve Huse and Chad McGinnis. Donna Crow and David Penny were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Sheriff Clint Perzee, Coroner Bill Cheatum, Probation Supervisor Barb King, State's Attorney Jim Devine, Circuit Clerk Lisa Hines and ETS Director Eric Raymond.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Paul Ducat and seconded by Steve Huse to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

During public comments, County Board Chairman John Shure reminded those in attendance of the holiday luncheon being held on December 14th at the Watseka Family Table restaurant. If you are planning to attend, you should contact Sarah Koester at the County Clerk's Office.

Sheriff Clint Perzee presented his monthly report to the committee as follows:

- Physical agility testing for new deputy list was on November 6th with 8 of the 11 applicants showing up. 1 applicant failed the physical agility test and 7 applicants proceeded to the written test on November 13th of which only 4 passed. These 4 candidates will be on the list for the Sheriff's Department to hire new deputies from going forward into 2022.
- Transported 2 inmates to Department of Corrections on December 16th
- Hired Wyatt Alt as a lateral transfer. Alt had previously worked as the Milford Chief of Police after starting with them on August 8, 2019. Deputy Alt will be on field training for the next 8 weeks.
- Gilman contract started on December 1st
- One inmate is being housed for Department of Corrections (as of November 27th). Department of Corrections has been contacted and we are awaiting a transport date from them.
- 47 arrests/intakes
- Current jail population is 15 (12 male, 3 female). On weekends we add 4 weekenders (3 males, 1 female). 1 on ankle bracelet.
- Jail: 9 doctor/hospital/emergency room visits this month, 2 mental health visits to jail, 3 lab visits by Iroquois Memorial Hospital, 9 nurse visits (every other Monday), 4 public health visits (every Thursday)
- Jail overtime for November = 282.75
- Part-time jail hours for November = 23

- Officer involved shooting on December 3rd in rural Danforth involving two deputies. Officers are on administrative leave with pay until the completion of the investigation by the Illinois State Police, per policy. Suspect was taken to hospital, has been charged, arrested and has posted the required bond.
- Due to the officer involved shooting, we may need to place on hold or provide less coverage for the Gilman contract car. Perzee has spoken with the mayor in Gilman regarding this and he understands our staffing issue with having two less deputies due to administrative leave.
- Perzee said services are available through Iroquois Mental Health Center and also County Board member Chad McGinnis if the officers need to speak to someone regarding the incident. The services are free of charge.
- The amount of time the officers will be on administrative is unknown, however it could range from 30 days to 3 months.

Ducat spoke about the changes being made in the interview room and asked Perzee to discuss it further. Perzee explained the room isn't used often and is being converted into a recorded interview room. A wall and a door will be installed and the investigators will be able to conduct their interviews. The room will be available for other departments, as well. The improvements were paid from the maintenance budget and the maintenance supervisor, along with a part-time maintenance employee, were able to complete the project. Ducat suggested Perzee submit an American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) application for funding the project.

Coroner Bill Cheatum submitted an additional claim to be paid for an autopsy.

Probation Supervisor Barb King reviewed the Probation & Court Services activity report for November with the committee.

State's Attorney Jim Devine reported he attended an annual State's Attorney conference last week. The Assistant State's Attorney position remains vacant. Devine learned that there are many counties without Assistant State's Attorneys due to individuals not wanting to be associated with law enforcement at this time. Devine also discussed body cameras that will be mandated in 2025. The pros of the body cameras provides coverage and protection for officers. However, the prosecution will be required to view every second of footage from all body cameras when an arrest is made. In some instances, footage has to be redacted. Devine is contemplating applying for ARPA funds to prepare for this mandate. Lastly, Devine presented a resolution for the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor and an invoice for \$8,000. They handle all of the County's appeals and conflict prosecutions. It was moved by Chad McGinnis and seconded by Huse to approve the resolution to the Office of the State's Attorneys Appellate Prosecutor in the amount of \$8,000. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Circuit Clerk Lisa Hines distributed her monthly report for November to the committee. A total of \$35,403.53 was received in fines and fees, \$1,771.03 was received from Credit Collection Partners. Hines presented an ordinance amending the Iroquois County law library fee. The current ordinance states the law library fee not exceed \$21 through December 31, 2021. Effective January 1, 2022, the filing fee is decreased to \$20. It was moved by Roger Bard and seconded by Ducat to approve the ordinance amending the Iroquois County Law Library Fee. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

ETS Director Eric Raymond distributed his monthly ETSB report to the committee. There is a NextGen 911 grant due by the end of January. The grant would include a flyover, which would assist the Planning & Zoning Office. The last flyover was in 2014. Shure added the ETS Board is searching for an individual to serve on its board.

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Ducat and seconded by McGinnis to pay the Judicial & Public Safety claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Joe Young and seconded by Steve Huse to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Suzie Werner with HomeStar Insurance reported on the recent insurance changeover from Health Alliance to Blue Cross Blue Shield stating everything went well. The Medicare Advantage plan with Health Alliance for retirees is scheduled for renewal on January 1, 2022. Werner will be sending a flyer to the Finance Office for employee distribution regarding pharmacies. CVS is not a preferred pharmacy. The flyer will provide information on Walmart pharmacy and Iroquois Memorial Hospital pharmacy, both of which are preferred pharmacies. CVS said they will be joining the network. Once this is finalized, an updated pharmacy listing will be sent out.

The department heads gave their monthly reports. They are as follows:

- Sheriff Clint Perzee distributed his monthly report as follows:
 - Physical agility testing for new deputy list was on 11/6/2021 with 8 of the 11 applicants present. 1 applicant failed the physical agility test. 7 applicants proceeded to the written test on 11/13/2021 of which only 4 passed. These 4 candidates will be on the list for the Sheriff's Department to hire new deputies from going forward into 2022.
 - Hired Wyatt Alt as a lateral transfer. Alt had previously worked as the Milford Chief of Police after starting with them on 8/8/2019. Deputy Alt will be on field training for the next 8 weeks.
 - Jail overtime for November was 282.75 hours
 - Part-time Jail hours for November was 23 hours
 - Jail had 9 doctor/hospital/emergency room visits, 2 mental health visits, 3 lab visits by Iroquois Memorial Hospital, 9 nurse visits (every other Monday), 4 public health visits (every Thursday)
 - Wall and associated costs for interview room was paid for within the maintenance budget but it will possibly be an item to apply for through the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds
 - Officer involved shooting on 12/3/2021 in rural Danforth involving two deputies. They are on administrative leave with pay until the completion of the investigation by the Illinois State Police per policy. Suspect was taken to the hospital, has been charged, arrested and has posted the required bond.
 - Gilman contract started on 12/1/2021. Due to the officer involved shooting, we may need to place this on hold or provide less coverage for the Gilman contract car. Perzee has spoken to the mayor about this and he understands our staffing issue with having two less deputies due to them being on administrative leave.
- County Clerk Breein Suer reported on the election omnibus bill that was passed this summer and the follow up trailer bill. There are required mailings that have to be mailed out informing registered voters of their ability to get on a permanent vote by mail list. The letters will be mailed prior to the primary election. An additional mailing will be done before the general election notifying any registered voter that didn't sign up for the permanent vote by mail list that they have the ability to do so. There has also been a change to the questions on the statement of economic interest forms. Suer has submitted two American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant

applications. One application is to fund ten years of records to be digitized and posted online. The second application is funding for election equipment.

- Treasurer Kurt Albers reported the final tax distribution was completed last month. Albers is looking to invest additional monies into an account with a higher paying interest rate. Albers said he has found a firm to invest with but it would require amending the County's investment policy because the account would not be in Iroquois County. Albers will keep the committee updated.
- EMA Director Eric Ceci reported he has been working on planning and hosting a tabletop exercise for a hazardous material incident. The exercise was conducted on December 6th and included Growmark, multiple fire departments and health care agencies. Ceci hosted a hazardous material awareness class on November 13th. Ceci attended a regional meeting for Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA). Ceci applied for a grant with the Illinois Emergency Management Agency (IEMA) for hazard mitigation to help finish writing the plan. Correspondence was received stating Iroquois County has been selected to move forward in the process. Ceci said we are 1 of 17 Counties to move forward in this process. Lastly, future trainings consist of aircraft training, active shooter training and cyber attack training.
- County Board Chairman John Shure reminded those in attendance of the holiday luncheon being held on December 14th after the County Board meeting at the Watseka Family Table. Those attending should contact Sarah Koester in the County Clerk's Office. Also, Shure said he received a letter from a gentleman in Colorado that works for the United States Post Office in regards to the post office in Claytonville, IL. Shure believes the intent is to close the Claytonville, IL post office. He will keep the committee updated. Lastly, Shure will distribute a new list of committee assignments at the board meeting on Tuesday. The new list includes combining the Finance committee and I.T. committee. Sizes of the other committees will also be reduced to prepare for the change in the number of board members.
- Finance Manager Jill Johnson reported the audit process is beginning and auditors will be onsite next week to do preliminary work. Johnson requested the committee review the draft balance sheet that was prepared by the Treasurer's Office. The Capital Improvement Fund and the Joint Dispatch Fund are showing negative balances and will need a transfer from the General Fund to bring them to a positive balance. Johnson explained more funds were used from these accounts than anticipated. The Joint Dispatch Fund also had some unforeseen overtime due to employee turnover this past year. Johnson said she is more confident with the overtime budgeted for the FY22 budget. It was moved by Michael McTaggart and seconded by Huse to transfer \$82,000 from the General Fund into the County Improvement Fund and transfer \$82,000 from the General Fund into the Joint Dispatch Center Fund. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

In regards to the funding for Joint Dispatch, Shure informed the committee he chose to move forward with the same billing process as what was used in the past. A letter was included with the billing advising the agencies we will be revising our process. Shure has since continued to work on these changes. Some of these changes could include charging the ambulances and fire departments on a calls for service basis. However, it does not appear that the police departments

can be charged the same due to some inconsistencies. If the County engages in additional law enforcement contracts, such as the contract in Gilman, that will be less money charged to the police departments. Shure welcomed any suggestions.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Young and seconded by Paul Bowers to pay the Finance claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by John Shure and seconded by Barbara Offill to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) informational packets were distributed to those in attendance and a presentation of the Act was given as follows:

- ARPA was signed into law on March 11, 2021 and Iroquois County was allotted \$5,266,577 to help mitigate the impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic.
- As of October 7th, there were 4,116 total Covid-19 cases with 3,393 confirmed cases and 74 individuals passed away with Covid-19. Our current population is 27,114 with 13,014 individuals receiving their first dose of the vaccine and 12,218 individuals receiving their second dose of the vaccine.
- The intent of the funds is for qualified businesses, not-for-profit entities, projects or direct to individuals based upon the ARPA rules, location, need, impact and equity. With the knowledge that municipalities received their own allocations, focus will be on rural areas of the County, County infrastructure and potential future emergency-related issues.
- All applicants are urged to read the interim final rule.
- Policies and procedures have been put in place by the ARPA committee. Before ARPA funds are utilized, special/internal and or other grant funds must be exhausted. The committee will identify and support communities that were unable or ineligible to participate in the CURES/PPP/CARES programs. Any Grantee's program that represents similar geography and/or service area to another Grantee, will be encouraged to coordinate and work together. Priority will be given to locally owned businesses and to employees/students within the County. Iroquois County will support submitted applications, infrastructure improvements and grant opportunities that address the effects of the pandemic on Iroquois County. Support will be designed to reduce future burden upon taxpayers and address infrastructure needs. Solicit public involvement, construct a consensus for projects and continue transparency modeled by all of Iroquois County Administration processes. A public meeting is being held on November 16th at 6:00 P.M.
- ARPA funds are not directly available for private non-profit entities within any municipality, school district, health department, homeowners/renters within municipalities, tourism-related entity or business, or any other entity that is eligible for and received ARPA funds via municipalities, PPP, SBA and/or associated direct Federal, State and/or municipal relief funds. These entities have access to other

ARPA funding and must apply to those sources first in order to be eligible for ARPA funds allocations.

- Common County submissions include public health, negative economic impacts, service to disproportionately impacted communities, premium pay, infrastructure, revenue replacement, and administrative expenses.

American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) chairman Paul Ducat explained there are two applications. One application is for funding under \$50,000 and the second application is for funding exceeding \$50,000. Applications under \$50,000 do not require quarterly reports. Finance Manager Jill Johnson also noted anyone turning in an application over \$50,000 must have an active DUNS number and an active SAMS.gov registration.

Moving forward, all applications should be submitted to the Finance Office and they will be reviewed by the ARPA committee. If an applicant has already receiving funding, such as CARES funding, they can still be considered but will be less of a priority. The funds they received from CARES or any other funding must be spent first. An applicant may submit multiple applications. Premium pay for employees was discussed. Johnson said the AFSCME union representative requested a meeting and requested a dollar amount for the union employees. A second meeting date is yet to be determined. Johnson suggested department heads put an application together for those employees not in the union if they are considering premium pay.

If an applicant is unsure of the amount they require for funding, an approximate amount should be listed on the application. Also, if the applicant applies for a certain amount but their project requires less funding, they will receive the lesser amount.

The next ARPA meeting will be held on December 14th at 1:00 P.M. There will also be a public informational meeting on November 16th at 6:00 P.M.

American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Chairman Paul Ducat reviewed the ARPA informational packet to those in attendance. Ducat explained in March 2021, the American Rescue Plan Act was signed into law. There is \$350 billion allocated for States and Local Recovery efforts and Iroquois County was allotted \$5,266,577. The funds will be received in two equal portions and are intended to help mitigate the impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic. The funds will be used to respond to the Covid-19 pandemic and make investments into infrastructure related to the pandemic and current/future mitigation.

Statistics from the health department's website show 4,116 total Covid-19 cases with 3,393 confirmed cases, 723 probable cases and 74 individuals have passed away with Covid-19. Iroquois County's population is 27,114. The percent of our population to receive the first dose of the Covid-19 vaccination is 48% and the percent of our population to receive the second dose of the Covid-19 vaccination is 45.1%.

Iroquois County intends to allocate funds for qualified businesses, not-for-profit entities, projects or direct to individuals based upon the ARPA rules. The focus will be on rural areas of the County, County infrastructure and potential future emergency related issues.

Iroquois County residents rely on services from the County Offices. The Iroquois County Public Health Department and ETSB-911 are separate entities managed by their own boards and funding sources. These departments have access to funds outside of ARPA funds allocated by the United States Department of Treasury. The County Board will look to identify areas of cooperation with these two entities.

Policies and procedures have been established by the committee as follows:

- Before ARPA funds are utilized, special/internal and or other grant funds will be exhausted.
- Identify and support communities that were unable or ineligible to participate in the CURES/PPP/CARES programs.
- Grantees must demonstrate access to continue operations post ARPA funding (no County funding).
- Any Grantee's program that represents similar geography and/or service area to another Grantee will be encouraged to coordinate and work together.
- Priority will be given to locally owned businesses and to employees/students within the County.

- Solicit public involvement, construct a consensus for projects and continue transparency modeled by all of Iroquois County Administration processes.
- Iroquois County will support submitted applications, infrastructure improvements and grant opportunities that address the effects of the pandemic on Iroquois County. Support will be designed to reduce future burden upon taxpayers and address infrastructure needs.

The ARPA funds are not directly available for private for-profit entities within any municipality, school district, health department, homeowners/renters within municipalities, tourism-related entity or business, or any other entity that is eligible for and received ARPA funds via municipalities, PPP, SBA and/or associated direct Federal, State and/or municipal relief funds. These entities have access to other ARPA funding and must apply to those sources first in order to be eligible for ARPA funds allocations.

Common County submissions include public health, negative economic impacts, services to disproportionately impacted communities, premium pay, infrastructure, revenue replacement, administrative expenses.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson stressed the importance of reviewing the interim final rule. All applications will should be submitted to the Finance Office. There are two separate ARPA applications. One application is for funding under \$50,000, the second application is for funding over \$50,000. Johnson informed everyone that quarterly reports are not required for funds awarded less than \$50,000.

The funds need to be allocated by December 2023 but the projects funded can extend through 2026. Johnson noted all County offices are eligible for funding.

Dale Strough addressed the committee asking if the funds could be appropriated for infrastructure on the County Farm and offering it for commercial and residential development. It was encouraged for cities and municipalities to submit applications for their needs.

Applications were provided within the informational packets and they will also be available on the County's website.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson added Ruder Technologies ran into some issues with the SIP trunk lines and is working with AT&T to get the issues resolved. The County has been paying a higher rate with AT&T since October but Johnson said the amount is approximately \$1,000 higher than usual, which isn't as high as the committee expected.

Taber also reported on renewals for services and software. The host servers haven't been renewed in the past because they were purchased 5 years ago. Johnson provided copies of Area Wide's quotes for the renewals of the host servers and VMware. Taber discussed email security stating there are logs that track what links users click on in their emails. Tracking each user has become troublesome with other clients as well, and Taber suggested turning the feature off. However, the email security would still be in place but the added feature of knowing the individual clicking on the links will be removed.

AreaWide is assisting the Jail and Courthouse with video conferencing solutions. The Sheriff's Department also has an older switch that AreaWide recommends replacing.

While working on the Illinois Economic Development Association (IEDA) computer, it was found that IEDA and Veteran's Assistance are operating on Iroquois County's guest network. AreaWide recommends removing them from the domain for increased security.

On-site visits continue to go well and have allowed the AreaWide representative to cleanup map drives and do user cleanup during his down time. Taber said AreaWide also continues to work on the .gov domain.

Taber spoke about the backup server issues and will send a quote to Johnson. Other items included for the FY22 budget year are UPS batteries and the SAN server. Taber will send quotes for all items.
