RESOLUTION NO. R2022-1

A RESOLUTION IN SUPPORT OF LAW ENFORCEMENT PROFESSIONALS AND DEMAND THE REPEAL OF H.B. 3653/THE SAFE-T ACT IN ITS ENTIRETY

WHEREAS, for generations, the brave men and women of the law enforcement community have answered the call to serve and protect our communities. Our Law Enforcement Officers embody the courage and honor that represent the best of the State, County, and Local Jurisdictions throughout the State of Illinois; and

WHEREAS, in moments of danger and desperation, the first people we turn to are Law Enforcement Officers. These often unsung heroes risk their lives so that we can live in peace and security; and

WHEREAS, enduring long shifts in dangerous and unpredictable circumstances, our Law Enforcement Officers demonstrate remarkable self-control and operate under extreme pressure with uncommon professionalism. They deal with complex, challenging situations, and see the worst elements of humanity in the underbelly of society, situations to which most citizens have the privilege of turning a blind eye; and

WHEREAS, we owe dutiful respect and humble gratitude to the Law Enforcement Officers who work tirelessly with honor, dedication, and integrity to protect us and sacrifice so much to maintain and defend civil order in our community; and

WHEREAS, on January 13, 2021 the Illinois General Assembly passed House Bill 3653, which sponsors of the bill called the SAFE-T Act, and abolished cash bail, hinders law enforcement's ability to apprehend offenders, fails to protect victims, and emboldens criminals by removing consequences; and

WHEREAS, the new law created a task force to study qualified immunity for police officers, created an anonymous compliant process to pressure officers, and made dangerous changes in the use of force by officers, putting both the public and law enforcement at risk; it changed the standards for felony murder to make it more difficult to charge some of our society's most dangerous perpetrators;

WHEREAS, the Iroquois County Board feels this new law has made the job of protecting the public more difficult for law enforcement officers; and

WHEREAS, the Iroquois County Board believes law enforcement is essential to protecting lives, property, and businesses, and firmly supports Law Enforcement Officers at State, County and Local levels who put their lives at risk every day to serve and protect our community.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE IROQUOIS COUNTY BOARD OF IROQUOIS COUNTY, ILLINOIS THAT:

SECTION 1: The Iroquois County Board thanks the Law Enforcement Officers who stand everyday as our guardians of peace and order, ready to protect our families and businesses, and our very freedoms.

SECTION 2: The Iroquois County Board publicly acknowledges our support and appreciation for the commitment and sacrifice made by every member of the law enforcement community to keep the public safe.

SECTION 3: The Iroquois County Board recognizes the importance of continuing to foster positive interactions between State, County, and Local law enforcement officers and members of our community.

SECTION 4: The Iroquois County Board acknowledges the rising trends in law enforcement response calls relating to mental health, domestic abuse, and addiction, and recognizes the need to support our community and our law enforcement officers with appropriate resources to help properly respond to these societal challenges.

SECTION 5: The Iroquois County Board recognizes the importance of continuing to promote diversity in our law enforcement recruitment efforts, and to invest in our police officer training and professional development programs.

SECTION 6: The Iroquois County Board acknowledges that law enforcement Officers oftentimes take it upon themselves to demonstrate random acts of generosity and kindness throughout our community, and do so without any desire for fanfare or public recognition.

SECTION 7: The Iroquois County Board encourages our fellow residents, business, civic groups, and sister agencies to do all in their power and spheres of influence to express their appreciation and support of our State, County, and Local Law Enforcement Officers.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, BY THE IROQUOIS COUNTY BOARD OF IROQUOIS COUNTY, ILLINOIS that we demand the Illinois General Assembly to value and protect crime victims and law enforcement, those that are on the streets protecting the community and public every day;

Your Committee to whom was referred **Management Services** would beg leave to submit the following report on the matters before them:

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on January 3, 2022 at 9:00 A.M. Members present Lyle Behrends, Paul Bowers, Donna Crow, Paul Ducat and John Zumwalt. Kevin Bohlmann and Sherry Johnson were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, County Board Member Charlie Alt, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake and 911 Director Eric Raymond.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Paul Bowers and seconded by John Zumwalt to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake's report included the following:

- Centrica Business Solutions (formerly SmartWatt) emailed a year two measurement and verification report. Their guaranteed savings of the energy performance project was \$35,018 and their verified savings over the past year was \$39,305. This is a savings surplus of \$4,287 for the County. The full report is available for review in the County Board office.
- Drake reported that with the snow and ice, forty-four bags of salt had to be applied but no plowing was needed.
- The elevator at the courthouse was having door closure issues. It was discussed that it will need refurbished in the future.
- The jail toilets and the oven had to be repaired.
- Small electrical repairs had to be addressed with the outside lights located at the Administrative building.
- There is a request to take down the tree located outside the Treasurer's office.

Donna Crow inquired about the Hiltz claim and Drake explained that they have to come out and pump frequently due to what gets put down the drains. A grinder for the septic was discussed.

The bids for the bathroom, conference room, hallway and break room were opened. There was one bid submitted by Arie Services Inc. at a cost of \$22,500. It included the following:

Bathroom

- Remove all bathroom fixtures, cap off one lavatory and one toilet.
- Replace with normal ADA compliant partitions, plumbing fixtures, grab bars and faucet.

- Patching tile floor to the closest match, reuse paper towel dispensers, infant changing table and mirror.
- Code required emergency lighting fixture to be installed.
- Patching all walls in bathroom and repainting.
- Remove and replace all cove base in bathroom.

Conference room and hallway

- Remove all cove base and replacing.
- Remove all old adhesive on walls, fix drywall where needed and painting all walls.

Break Room

- Remove kitchen sink and faucet, remove old electric stove, remove all lower and upper cabinets and remove all cove base.
- Fix all drywall and painting.
- Install new lower and upper cabinets on both sides of the room.
- Install new counter tops and new kitchen sink and faucet.
- New electrical circuits for microwave oven and refrigerator and installation.

After a short discussion, Bowers made the motion to accept Arie Services Inc. bid to remodel the breakroom, conference room and hallway and bathroom for the amount of \$22,500 and it was seconded by Zumwalt. Motion carried by a roll call vote.

The County Farm soil test received from Pro-Ag Consulting was reviewed. The results were as follows:

Ph level: 6.4

Phosphorus level: 66

Potassium level: 205

Organic matter level: 3.3

Cation exchange capacity level: 12.1

It was noted that the fertilizer costs are up from previous years. Zumwalt made the motion to put out for fertilizer bids at a low and high rate. Bowers seconded the motion. Motion carried by a roll call vote.

The County Farm tile work project will be put on the agenda next month for further discussion so bids can be put out.

Lyle Behrends informed the committee to start thinking about what changes they would want to see to the County Farm lease before its next renewal.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Bowers and seconded by Paul Ducat to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

During old business, Finance Manager Jill Johnson gave an update on the Animal Control Building bids. Bid packets were sent out to the two vendors that were interested and that there is one bid turned into the County Clerk's office. Bids are being accepted until January 28, 2022 and will be opened at the January 31, 2022 Management meeting.

Your committee met at the Administrative Center on January 4, 2022 at 9:00 A.M. Members present were Roger Bard and Ernie Curtis. Kevin Coughenour, Thomas Lynch and Barbara Offill were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson and ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Ernie Curtis and seconded by John Shure to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Curtis and seconded by Shure to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There were no public comments

Finance Manager Jill Johnson reported there are currently four dogs being kept by the County. Open cases include a bite case in Gilman and an assisted police case by picking up 4 dogs in Milford. The Animal Control Officers closed 5 cases during the month. There was 1 animal bite, 1 relinquishment and 3 stray pickups. The registration deposit for December was \$5,200. Johnson praised the Kankakee County Animal Control and the Ford County Animal Control for all the assistance that they have provided. Johnson reminded the committee that the Animal Control building bids are due on January 28, 2022.

ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert reviewed the summary report of programs for FY2022 with the committee. Environmental Health performed 32 food inspections, 1 reinspection and issued 114 permits. There were 10 water sample kits tested. Also, 15 new well inspections were performed, issued 7 permits for new wells, issued 6 permits for sealed wells and performed 4 inspections for sealed wells. Environmental Health completed 3 private sewage inspections. There were 35 tobacco compliance inspections, 1 body art inspection and 1 sewage complaint investigation for the year. There were 27 garbage waste haulers inspected. Immunizations include 14 childhood immunizations, 3 adult immunizations, 17 flu shots, 3 pneumonia shots and 460 COVID-19 vaccinations. In the Tuberculosis Program, there was 1 skin test given. The Jail Program included an assessment of 10 inmates during the fiscal year. Vision screenings were provided for 174 children and hearing screenings were provided for 305 children. There were no animal bite investigations for December. Senior Services is providing care for 183 individuals.

Schippert updated the committee on COVID-19, stating there has been a tremendous increase in cases. Schippert reported the following statistics:

- 238 new cases last week
- 1 COVID-19 outbreak
- 5,538 cases to date
- 89 individuals have passed away with COVID-19
- Ages 5-11: 6.9% vaccinated
- Ages 12-17: 28.75% vaccinated
- Ages 18-64: 49.62% vaccinated
- Ages 65 +: 78.46% vaccinated

Schippert stated the unvaccinated population is what is being seen more and more in serious hospitalization cases. Younger and healthy individuals are passing away with the COVID-19 virus. The vaccine does not prevent people from getting the COVID-19 virus but does help to avoid serious health outcomes that could last a lifetime. She went on to explain the importance of the antibodies that help to fight off the virus. Vaccination rates have been on the rise. It was expressed how important it is to abide by the guidelines and to stay at home when sick. Assistance is available through the ICPHD to help with groceries and other necessities. Schippert also commented on how more people need to be vaccinated before there can even begin to be some control over the COVID-19 virus.

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Curtis and seconded by Shure to adjourn at 9:35 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on January 11, 2022 at 9:45 A.M. Members present were Roger Bard, Ernie Curtis and Chad McGinnis. Kevin Coughenour and Barbara Offill were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Treasurer Kurt Albers, County Clerk Breein Suver, Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler, ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert, William Hornbuckle and Brian Havens

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Chad McGinnis and seconded by Ernie Curtis to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by McGinnis and seconded by Curtis to pay the claims subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There were no public comments.

The department heads gave their monthly reports:

- County Clerk Breein Suver reported that letters have been mailed to the clerks of all the taxing bodies requesting their lists of persons required to file a Statement of Economic Interest, which will subsequently be mailed in March to all those named and required to file. There is continued work with Environmental Health finishing up waste hauler inspections and permitting. Suver presented the new County Board district maps that were created by Bruce Harris and Associates, the County GIS vendor. She explained that there will be more layers added onto the GIS map including County Board, Congressional District, and State House and Senate layers. Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler has agreed to pay for this project from the GIS fund. Lastly, she is currently working with US Imaging and Fidar, the County Recording software vendor, to microfilm documents from 2003 to 2008.
- County Treasurer Kurt Albers reported the office is completing regular day to day business.
- Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler reported that the year end work is being completed. He noted that in January there will be an Assessors meeting and he should find out how many Assessors there will be.

The Planning & Zoning report for November was distributed to the committee as follows:

- Building Permits –December 2021
 - Agriculture – 1
 - Residential – 3
 - Wind Towers – 0
- Building Permits – FY2022
 - Residential – 3
 - Agriculture – 1
 - Wind Towers – 0
- Building Inspections – December 2021
 - 50
- Zoning Board of Appeals – December 28, 2021: William Hornbuckle and Brian Havens for a conditional use permit to manufacture, buy and sell firearms. This tract is located in Section 9, Sheldon Township, 26N, R11 W of the second P.M. The permanent identification number is 27-09-400-009. This tract is located at 1635 North 2800 East Road, Sheldon, Illinois 60966
- William Hornbuckle and Brian Havens addressed the committee about starting an at home business to buy and sell firearms. Hornbuckle stated that

it would run out of his detached garage and may look into doing some internet sales in the future. Wants to do firearm coding and transfers as well. Havens added it would provide a service to the community. State and Federal laws require zoning before licenses could be issued. Roger Bard asked for the manufacturing to be defined. Havens explained that anytime parts that have serial numbers are combined with un-serial numbered parts it is considered to be manufactured. He went on to explain that in order to work on serial numbered parts, they would need the manufactured license. Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler added that State and Federal follow up with his office every year to make sure zoning has not changed. McGinnis made the motion to approve William Hornbuckle and Brian Havens conditional use application to buy and sell firearms. Curtis seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Discussion on building permit enforcement fines and penalties was tabled until the next meeting.

IEDA Director Angel Crawford informed that committee that a publication is in the works. McGinnis explained he needed some time to get caught up in order to move forward with assisting with this project. Discussion on publication of rural homesteads was tabled until the next meeting.

County Clerk Breein Suver lead a discussion on polling locations for the June 2022 election. She explained that 3, possibly 4, location moves will be permanent and a few other changes will be temporary. The changes are necessary to better accommodate voters. Some of the polling place changes include the following:

- Stockland: from Town Hall to the Fire Departments Annex building
- Beaver: from Town Hall to the Community building
- Concord: from Town Hall to the Dunning Park building
- Pigeon Grove: from Village Hall to the American Legion building

Curtis made the motion to adopt a resolution to approve the temporary and permanent polling place locations. McGinnis seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Curtis and seconded by McGinnis to adjourn at 10:05 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

WHEREAS, the County Clerk has determined that the current polling place for the Beaver Precinct, located at the Beaver Township Hall, 304 3rd, in Donovan, IL 60931 should be changed permanently to the Community Building, 404 3rd, Donovan, IL 60931 to best accommodate voters; and,

WHEREAS, the County Clerk has determined that the current polling place for the Concord Precinct, located at the Town Hall, 104 W Lincoln, Iroquois, IL, 60945 should be changed permanently to the Park Building at Dunning Park, 202 N Main, Iroquois, IL 60945 to best accommodate voters; and,

WHEREAS, the County Clerk has determined that the current polling place for the Stockland Precinct, located at the Town Hall, 856 N 2845 East Rd., Stockland, IL 60967 should be changed permanently to the Stockland Fire Department Annex, 861 N 2840 East Rd, Stockland, IL 60967 to best accommodate voters; and,

WHEREAS, the County Clerk has determined that the current polling place for the Prairie Green Precinct, located at the Fire Station in Prairie Green Township, 300 North & 2800 East, Prairie Green Township, should be changed temporarily to the Prairie Green Church of Christ 278 N 2800 East Rd, Prairie Green Township, to best accommodate voters in the Primary Election to be held on June 28, 2022; and,

WHEREAS, at the regular Tax/Planning & Zoning Committee Meeting of January 4, 2022, after review, discussion, and consideration, the committee agrees with the County Clerk to change the polling place for the following Precincts-Beaver, Concord, and Stockland for the upcoming Primary Election on June 28, 2022 and subsequent elections and the Prairie Green Precinct temporarily for the upcoming Primary Election to be held on June 28, 2022.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, by the Iroquois County Board that the Precincts will remain as previously established with polling place relocation permanently for the Precincts in Beaver, Concord, and Stockland as listed above for the upcoming Primary Election on June 28, 2022 and subsequent elections and the Prairie Green Precinct temporarily for the upcoming Primary Election to be held on June 28, 2022.

Your Committee met at the Courthouse on January 5, 2022 at 3:00 P.M. Members present were Lyle Behrends, Laverne Boettcher, Paul Ducat and David Penny. Chad McGinnis was absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Sheriff Clint Perzee, Probation Supervisor Barb King, ETS Director Eric Raymond and Finance Manager Jill Johnson.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by David Penny and seconded by Paul Ducat to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Sheriff Clint Perzee presented his monthly report to the committee as follows:

- Transported 2 inmates to Department of Corrections on December 23rd
- Deputy Alt is progressing through field training and is currently on night shift being supervised by Deputy Feller.
- 43 arrests/intakes
- Current jail population is 15 (12 male, 3 female). On weekends we add 3 weekenders (2 males, 1 female). 1 on ankle bracelet.
- Jail: 3 doctor/hospital/emergency room visits this month, 3 mental health visits to jail, 2 lab visits by Iroquois Memorial Hospital, 2 nurse visits (every other Monday), 4 public health visits (every Thursday)
- Jail overtime for December = 196
- Part-time jail hours for December = 18
- Two deputies are still on administrative leave due to the officer involved shooting until the completion of the investigation by the Illinois State Police per policy.
- Due to the officer involved shooting, there is a hold on the Gilman contract car and has been discussed with the Gilman Mayor. The Sheriff is still providing Gilman with 10 hours of coverage on Friday nights.
- Sheriff informed the committee that he met with ICRMT, the County's liability and property insurance carrier. They discussed Jail and Patrol policy updates. Training and other services are also available.
- Sheriff's year end 2021 report included:
 - Calls for service: 9,299
 - Prisoners booked in:
 - Adult – 558
 - Juvenile – 11
 - Total – 557
 - Average daily population: 19
 - Average length of stay: 18
 - Inmate transports to DOC: 18
 - Inmates picked up at other counties: 41
 - Civil Process Services: 1,079
 - Tow Reports: 92
 - Accident Reports: 265
 - Offense Reports: 579

Probation Supervisor Barb King requested that BP be put on the approved list of prepay claims. She explained that due to how BP processes their invoices, they always end up late. Finance Jill Johnson explained that BP is a credit card and all of the fuel credit cards are on the list and did not see an issue adding on King's request. Ducat made the motion to include BP on the prepay claims list for Probation and Laverne Boettcher seconded. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried. The Probation & Court Services activity report for December was reviewed with the committee.

ETS Director Eric Raymond distributed his monthly ETS report to the committee. Raymond informed the committee that bids for a new phone system for ETSB are being sought out. A grant opportunity would include a flyover for the GIS map, which would also assist Iroquois County. The last flyover was in 2014 and it would be beneficial to have updated landmarks, buildings and etc. to help assist with 911 calls. The ETS Board is searching for an individual to serve on its board.

There was no old business.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Penny and seconded by Boettcher to pay the Judicial & Public Safety claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried

Your committee met at the Administrative Center on January 11, 2022 at 9:00 A.M.

Members present were Charlie Alt, Paul Bowers, Ernie Curtis and Joe Young. Steve Huse, Sherry Johnson and Michael McTaggart were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John

Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, County Clerk Breein Suver, Treasurer Kurt Albers, ETS Director Eric Raymond, Myron Munyon with Compass Insurance, Suzie Werner with HomeStar Insurance and Michael Taber with Area-Wide Technologies.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Paul Bowers and seconded by Ernie Curtis to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Myron Munyon with Compass Insurance reported that it is going well with the new liability, property and worker compensation carrier. Illinois Counties Risk Management Trust (ICRMT) has been in contact with Finance Manager Jill Johnson and Sheriff Clint Perzee. ICRMT is currently reviewing the County's policies and should be issued shortly.

Suzie Werner with HomeStar Insurance reported that the switch from Health Alliance health insurance to Blue Cross Blue Shield (BCBS) went smooth. Health Alliance has sent BCBS the deduction report in order to credit deductibles for December due to BCBS using the calendar year. Werner informed the committee that the transitional credit from BCBS should appear on the January invoice.

Michael Taber with Area-Wide Technologies gave his report as follows:

- Area-Wide Technologies reviewed the County's systems and contacted the software vendors for any vulnerabilities. Taber informed the committee that all updates have been completed.
- Quotes on the SAN server, backup server and battery backups are being prepared. These items were approved in the FY 2022 budget.
- The Courthouse phone system is being tested on Monday, January 10th. Johnson included that Ruder Technologies will be doing training on the new system at the Courthouse on Friday, January 7th. It was noted that a plan of action should be discussed in case of a connection failure.

The department heads gave their monthly reports. They are as follows:

- County Clerk Breein Suver presented the new County Board district maps that were created by Bruce Harris and Associates, the County GIS vendor. She explained that there will be more layers added onto the GIS map including County Board, Congressional District, and State House and Senate layers. Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler has agreed to pay for this project from the GIS fund. Suver explained that there has been an issue with the recording computer in the County Clerk's office. The computer is having memory issues and is being assessed by Area-Wide Technologies. Petition circulation will begin January, 13th and there are packets ready and available in the County Clerk's office for those who wish to run in the upcoming election.
- Treasurer Kurt Albers reported that the office is working on cleaning out old files and preparing for the new year.
- Sheriff Clint Perzee reported to the committee that overtime was down for the previous month. There are still 2 deputies out on administrative leave for the officer involved shooting. This led to the Gilman contract car to be put on hold. The Sheriff is still providing Gilman with 10 hours on Friday nights per the understanding of the Gilman Mayor. Perzee explained to the committee that the Department of Corrections sent out a contract for reimbursement costs relating to housing inmates. They are offering \$35 per day and there may be a small

possibility for more funds in the future. Lastly, Sheriff read over the department year-end report for 2021.

- ETS Director Eric Raymond reported that 911 is currently seeking out bids for a new phone system and also the GIS fly over. He explained that both of these projects would be funded by a NextGen 911 grant which is due at the end of the month of January.
- County Board Chairman John Shure mentioned to the committee that UCCI sent out the check for the \$1,200 dues. Due to being with ICRMT, the UCCI dues are going to be only \$300.
- Finance Manager Jill Johnson reported the following:
 - County Board:
 - Received the invoice for ICRMT in the amount of \$21,742.50 for liability and property and \$9,933.39 for workers compensation.
 - IT
 - The SAN, Firewall and Dell annual renewals quotes were received.
 - Animal Control
 - Animal Control deposit was \$5,200 for the month of December.
 - Finance
 - Auditors were on site at the administrative building towards the end of December and are coming out again the week of January 11th. Their focus will be on the Circuit Clerk's office.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Bowers and seconded by Curtis to pay the claims subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There was no old business.

In new business, Joe Young expressed the need to show some appreciation to the Sheriff's department. Shure stressed that focus needed to be on having discussions with any contacts of influence. Sheriff explained that rules put in place since the COVID-19 virus, are very frustrating to law enforcement officers. Young made the motion to prepare a resolution in order to show appreciation to the Sheriff's department and it was seconded by Curtis. Motioned carried by a voice vote.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Curtis and seconded by Bowers to adjourn at 9:37 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your Committee to whom was referred **American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)** would beg leave to submit the following report on the matters before them:

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on December 14, 2021 at 1:00 P.M. Members present were Paul Ducat, Charlie Alt, Donna Crow, Barbara Offill and John Shure. Also present Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Sheriff Clint Perzee, County Clerk Breein Suver, Coroner Bill Cheatum, Treasurer Kurt Albers, ETS Director Eric Raymond, IEDA Director Angel Crawford, County Board member Joe Young and Sheldon Township Supervisor Terry Mabbitt.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by John Shure and seconded by Barbara Offill to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson reviewed the applications that have been submitted to the committee thus far. Going forward, Johnson will email all applications to the committee members for review prior to the meeting. They are as follows:

- Ford Iroquois 4-H Foundation, Inc. is requesting \$18,600. The Ford Iroquois 4-H Foundation holds an annual auction to help support Ford and Iroquois 4-H programs. The auction has been cancelled two years in a row due to COVID. Cancelling these auctions has caused them to lose over \$30,000 in revenue over the last two years. The funding requested will be used to make a difference in local 4-H youth programming for over 450 Iroquois 4-H members.
- St. Mary's Cemetery Association is requesting \$10,000 for mower replacement and repairs and replacement on many of the 100 plus year old headstones. It was noted that St. Mary's Cemetery is the only active cemetery in Beaverville Township and is non tax supported. Funding for maintenance is from donations from church members and ancestors of previously interned church members. Grave sales and also a part of income. During the pandemic, church attendance and donations have decreased.
- Iroquois County Clerk is requesting \$500,000 for the purchase of election equipment. Funds in the amount of \$49,736.44 were received from the CARES Act Grant but were not able to be used for election equipment.
- Iroquois County Clerk is requesting \$76,728.50 for microfilm conversion of documents for online access for 1980-1989.
- Iroquois County Sheriff's Department is requesting \$4,500 for a stand-alone audio and video recorded room at the Iroquois County Sheriff's Department. This would benefit the Sheriff's Office, Jail and other local police departments and agencies needing to utilize the facility. The interview room would assist in investigations providing the State's Attorney with quality evidence for the cases brought to the courts.
- Iroquois County Sheriff's Department is requesting \$18,095.46 to install video equipment at the Iroquois County Courthouse and Jail that will allow for video court and telehealth. Equipment would reduce the need for arrestees to be transferred to court and doctor appointments.
- Iroquois County Sheriff's Department is requesting \$24,924 to install Sloan electric flush sensors on all toilets in the Administrative building, Courthouse and Jail. Install Elkay water fountains, including water bottle fillers, at the Administrative building and Courthouse. Install no-touch door foot pulls on all bathroom doors at the Administrative building, Courthouse and Jail.
- Iroquois County Sheriff's Department is requesting \$258,720.60 for a complete CAD, JMS, records and report writing system by Central Square. This would assist Iroquois County in many ways including dispatching EMA, police, fire, EMS, mapping, Jail management, records and civil process, police reports.
- Iroquois County Sheriff's Department is requesting \$136,698.12 for a full body x-ray scanner with a temperature scanner. This will be a very useful addition to the Iroquois County Jail and would reduce liability in many ways. The x-ray scanner is used when arrestees are brought into the Iroquois County Jail to ensure they have not ingested or secreted contraband items in body orifices. The Adani x-ray scanner will also scan the arrestee's temperatures prior to the scan.
- Iroquois County Sheriff's Department is requesting \$150,000 for payment to essential workers who work in any capacity for the Iroquois County Sheriff's Office. These workers have been diligent and have risked their health while placing

themselves in dangerous situations. The Sheriff's Office has continued to provide 24 hour services to Iroquois County with no shutdown or closures. The employees' selfless actions during this pandemic should be commended and compensated.

In regards to payment for essential workers, County Board Chairman John Shure questioned whether Perzee should be applying for these funds or if the request should come from the Fraternal Order of Police (FOP) Union. Perzee said a conversation was held with the FOP representative, Jeff Burke. Mr. Burke advised the Sheriff's Department to apply for the funding as other County Sheriff's Departments are doing the same. Johnson suggested the committee implement an amount either County wide or have the individual departments submit their own applications for payment for essential workers. Shure also reminded the committee of the many part-time employees on payroll and whether this funding should include them. County Clerk Breein Suver added that Macon County passed a resolution for their ARPA funds that included two tiers for premium pay to employees. Coroner Bill Cheatum asked that his deputies, which are part-time employees, be considered for premium pay. They were in the homes of many people with COVID-19.

Johnson reported she is working on the application for the Animal Control building.

Shure stressed the urgency for the election equipment applied for by the County Clerk's Office. Shure has asked Suver for a timeline on when she needs approval for ordering and if the equipment needs paid in advance.

The next steps for the committee members is to do a full review of each application. Donna Crow offered a suggestion of accepting applications for three months before approving any applications. The next ARPA meeting will be held on January 7th at 10:00 A.M.

There was no old business.

During new business, Cheatum informed the committee he will be submitting an application for the replacement of a cooler facility.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Charlie Alt and seconded by Crow to adjourn at 2:42 P.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Crow made the motion to include on the ARPA application, if an applicant received any Federal funding that they include if it had all been allocated. John Shure seconded the motion. A roll call was taken. Motion carried.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson explained that the applications one through ten were previously reviewed at the December 14th ARPA meeting. The committee started their review with application number eleven. She also explained that any representative present would be able to speak to their application. Applications reviewed were as followed:

11. Rapid Assembly Inc. was represented by Pete Jeglinski. Jeglinski explained that the amount requested for \$48,000.00 was to assist employees due to lack of work. Shure had asked how the amount requested was decided. Jeglinski explained that the amount requested is what would help his employees. Finance Manager Jill Johnson requested that Jeglinski provide a narrative about his business and as to how the business was affected by the COVID-19 pandemic. She also informed him that financials would need to be provided and gave the example of a profit and loss report.

12. Iroquois County Public Defender's office application was reviewed by Johnson. The amount was requested was \$19,000.00. The narrative provided explained that the funds would be used to purchase two laptops, essential worker pay and for office space at the Iroquois County Courthouse. The ARPA committee had questions and the Iroquois County Public Defender's office will be contacted about the following:

- Is the request for laptops and office space determined by the Chief Judge?
- How is their process is currently being done?
- Would Telehealth or Telecourt be able to be utilized by the Public Defender if that application would be approved?
- Additional narrative explanation was requested as to how laptops and office space would help to mitigate in the future.

Judge Kara Bartucci explained that while the Public Defender and clients are at the Courthouse, the use of the jury rooms is available when there is not a jury sequestered and while at the Jail they also have space available for meetings.

13. Addiction Recovery Inc. application for the amount of \$500,000.00 was presented by John Marusarz, Director of Business Development. Marusarz explained that Addiction Recovery Services Inc. is a behavioral health care practice that aids in mental health and substance abuse

services. He explained that through Telehealth, they are currently assisting throughout Iroquois County. Marusarz explained that it was noticed since the start of COVID-19 pandemic, a need to identify a need for treatment. He explained that people stopped going to treatment. He stated their researched defined that the need for treatment is on the rise. The funds requested are to be used for to be used for a location and staffing costs. He explained that many of the clients that were served were not able to pay for the services and the income they received prevents them from turning to banks for the funds. The expansion to Iroquois County includes a big focus on opiate epidemic. Addiction Recovery Inc. would concentrate on researching the users and assist with any education or intervention needed to be proactive. Marusarz informed the committee that a location has been identified and he hopes that if the funds are granted it would create jobs. Addiction Recovery Services Inc. has to be Telehealth ready. This creates the potential to have services available to persons in case of future shut downs. Funds were previously received by the 708 Board in the amount of \$200,000.00 in which have been allocated. Marusarz stated that they are currently licensed in the City of Chicago and need to have a location in Iroquois County in order to obtain a license. Crow identified that after the grant, Addiction Recovery Services Inc. would have to be able to sustain on its own. Marusarz verified that there would be a revenue stream that would pay for costs after and funds granted by the County were expunged.

16. RVClean.org withdrew their application requesting funds.

17. Laurie Lenz's request for \$10,000.00 was to make repairs to a rental occupied by a low-income senior citizen. It was explained that she could not evict the previous tenant due to COVID-19 and the house was left in disrepair. The committee requested the following of the applicant:

- To provide a written narrative explaining in detail the reasoning behind the requested amount.
- To provide financials to back up the rental income loss.

18. The Village of Clifton is requesting \$260,000.00 to replace transite water mains. The Village is to be contacted with the following:

- To provide a written narrative explaining in detail the reasoning behind the requested amount and how it will help to mitigate in the future.
- Were all the funds already granted allocated?
- To provide any quotes or invoices.

19. Prairieview Lutheran Homes requests \$500,000.00 for COVID-19 prevention and mitigation. The request for funds would allow for them to finish or purchase the following:

- Finishing a sunroom in the amount of \$100,000.00
- An office remodel in the amount of \$175,000.00
- Furniture replacement in the amount of \$50,000.00
- Purchase of PPE and electronic devices in the amount of \$50,000.00
- Negative pressure rooms in the amount of \$50,000.00
- Assist with employment costs in the amount of \$175,000

Praireview Lutheran Homes will be contacted with the following request:

- To have a representative present to clarify questions the committee have at the next meeting.

Chairman Paul Ducat asked to review the application #6 for the Iroquois County Sheriff Clint Perzee's request of Telehealth and Telecourt. Judge Kara Bartucci was present for further discussion on how the project would assist the Courts as well. She explained that less exposure from the inmate and correctional officers would help to not spread any illness such as the COVID-

19 virus within the Iroquois County Courthouse as well as other County Courthouses. It was noted that services such as Addiction Recovery Services Inc. would be benefited by this project. Shure inquired about the recently State passed Safe Act and if it would have an effect on the use of Telehealth and Telecourt. It was explained by Bartucci that they have yet to have a determination of how the new Act would affect Iroquois County inmate population and the effectiveness of Telehealth and Telecourt. It is believed by some that it would decrease the population but also there may be an increase due to the Courts' options being limited. Shure also inquired as to how this would decrease costs incurred and Bartucci explained that when an inmate needs to be at Court physically, they have to be accompanied by a correctional officer. When an inmate needs to be brought to the courthouse or transferred, an additional officer has to be available to watch over the jail.

20. The Iroquois County Treasurer Kurt Albers's application for additional security devices at the Administrative Center. The Treasurer was asked to provide the following information:

- Narrative as to how the request is related to the effects or future mitigation of any shut downs.
- Include how the annual additional costs would be paid for.

21. Eastern Illinois Mutual Aid Fire Association application for a building purchase. The building would be utilized as a centralized training center and storage facility. The requested amount is for \$350,000.00. Crow spoke on the importance of having something like this project and would benefit the county. Jeff Glenn, President of Eastern Illinois Mutual Aid Fire Association, told the committee that there is a building available for purchase that is centrally located in the county. He explained that this purchase would be an advantage to all the fire departments in Iroquois County. They currently have a command post/safety education trailer, mobile disaster shelter, Incident Management Supply Trailer, utility vehicle and trailer and a portable light power. All equipment has been utilized within Iroquois County in times of floods, missing persons, assisting the hospital, field fires and fire safety education in schools. Since the COVID-19 pandemic, Glenn stressed the importance of combined training between fire, emergency medical services, police and the Emergency Management Agency (EMA). He explained that many personnel have been exposed and that they have had to redesign how each situation is handled. A commercial sprayer is used every time to help disinfect all vehicles and equipment. Many of the firehouses in the county do not have the room to disinfect properly due to the equipment needing to be spread out, cleaned thoroughly and dried. Finance Manager Jill Johnson asked if the association would have the funds to pay for costs beyond the ARPA funds. Glenn explained that they could afford the utility and other costs going forward. By having the equipment stored inside and centrally would allow all departments to use and also keep the equipment out of the weather. Most of the equipment currently sits outside. Crow commended the departments for what they have had to encounter with COVID-19.

22. The Village of Danforth put an application to repair water main and to complete a loop for proper distribution. The request is for \$30,000.00 to finish the project. Larry Decker and Greg Schroeder were present to discuss the application. Decker explained that a quote for \$23,000.00 was received and the request was made to cover costs and any overhead costs.

23. The Village of Danforth had a second application to assist in the cost of replacing the water meters. That request is in the amount of \$40,000.00. Decker explained that the village received ARPA funds in the amount of \$75,041.21 and they are being allocated to purchase water meters. Johnson requested the Village of Danforth's financials to complete the application.

24. The Village of Onarga's application in the amount of \$49,300.00, is to replace sewage grinders. The committee requested the following information:

- To provide financials
- If they received ARPA funds, how they are allocated.
- A narrative as to how the project would help mitigate in the future.

25. The Village of Onarga applied for \$45,600.00 to make downtown and municipality sidewalks handicap accessible. The committee requested the following information:

- To provide financials
- If they received ARPA funds, how they are allocated
- A narrative as to how the project would help mitigate in the future.

27. Health Chek-Health Coaching Inc. applied for \$45,000.00 for small business economic assistance. Crow noted that a Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) loan was received. The committee requested the additional information as there was not a representative present:

- To provide financials.
- How much was received in PPP funding?
- What the funds requested would be used for?
- A narrative as to how the project would help mitigate in the future or in recovery from the COVID-19 pandemic.

It was moved by Ducat and seconded by Crow to enter into executive session at 12:05 P.M. under statute 5 ILCS 120/2/c1: The appointment, employment, compensation, discipline, performance, or dismissal of specific employees of the public body. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

It was moved by Ducat and seconded by Alt to come out of executive session at 2:07 P.M. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

After further discussion on the applications received and reviewed, the following motions were made:

- Shure made the motion to adopt a resolution approving Ford-Iroquois 4-H Foundation, Inc. American Rescue Plan Act application in the amount of \$18,600.00 to provide funding for the 4-H enrollment fees. Crow seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

(The following paragraph was removed from the report and sent back to committee for further consideration per action taken by the full County Board at the January 11, 2022 Recessed Session County Board meeting.)

- Crow made the motion to adopt a resolution approving the Iroquois County Sheriff's American Rescue Plan Act application in the amount of \$18,095.46 for Video Court and Telehealth. Shure seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.
- Ducat made the motion to adopt a resolution approving the Iroquois County Sheriff's American Rescue Plan Act application in the amount of \$136,698.12 for a full body x-ray scanner. Crow seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.
- Ducat made the motion to adopt a resolution approving the Eastern Illinois Mutual Aid Fire Association's American Rescue Plan Act application in the amount of \$350,000.00 for a multi-use facility to be used for training and storage. Crow seconded the motion. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Charlie Alt and seconded by John Shure to adjourn at 2:37 P.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.
