PAYROLL

The Board discussed the payroll that was presented for approval. Mr. Bohlmann questioned the payment in the amount of \$7,478.69 to a Health Department employee. He also wanted to know which entity pays for IMRF on the Health Department employees. It was confirmed that the payment was for the final payment of COVID 19 hours due to the employee and that the Health Department reimburses the County for IMRF payments. Mrs. Crow asked Finance Director Jill Johnson to provide a breakdown of hours and rate of pay that were included on the final payment of COVID 19 hours for the employee, before the Board voted on the payroll. There were 179 hours paid at \$64.82 per hour. Mr. McTaggart brought up the fact that there are very strict cut-offs when it comes to the audit. He questioned how the Board would not have to correct their audits from 2019 through 2021, since the hours that were being paid out were from those previous audit periods. There was additional discussion regarding overtime payments that have been made to the same employee, since there were overtime hours claimed on previous payroll periods. It was moved by Mr. Young and seconded to approve the July payroll. The motion carried by a roll call vote.

PUBLIC COMMENTS

Cylis West, from Watseka, addressed the Board regarding ICPHD. He wanted to first thank Mr. Bohlmann and the other Board members that voted no on the payroll. He also spoke about Board of Health meetings he has attended, and felt that people are being misled by the Health Department Administrator. At their most recent meeting, Mr. West said the Administrator reported that the Health Department had to send money back to the Illinois Department of Public Health because they didn't spend all of a grant that was received. He said a small amount of money was left on the table and the Administrator blamed the former Finance Officer for not keeping the Administrator informed of monies remaining in the grant. He went on to say that lies have been told to current and past staff, with claims that the amount sent back to the State was approximately \$80,000, which he does not believe to be true. Mr. West went on to talk about questions and answers given at the previous Board of Health meeting, which in his opinion, prove the Administrator has no clue about the day to day operations of the Health Department.

Mike Ruble, from WIVR River Country Milner Media, expressed concerns that he and others have had a hard time hearing Board discussion in the back of the room and asked for the issue to be addressed, so those in attendance can hear everything that is being said during the meetings.

Mr. McTaggart asked to comment on the statements made by Mr. West in earlier public comments. He attended the Board of Health meeting in which the repayment of grant monies was

discussed. He felt as a taxpayer, the mindset of the board was wasteful and shocking. He said the Administrator claimed this was the first time grant monies had been returned, and he found it unfathomable that the Health Department could spend every grant down to the penny.

Kirk Gohsman introduced himself as the new Executive Director at Banyan Treatment Center in Onarga.

CHAIRMAN COMMENTS

There were no Chairman comments.

OUTSIDE ORGANIZATION REPORTS

Cheyenne Denoyer, with Workforce Development gave an update of her organization. She stated that all youth on caseload have completed their work experience program and all but one have received reviews stating they either meet or exceed work standards. As for the Adults she has 7 certified CNA's, 3 CDL licenses, 9 pending applications for CDL, CNA and PTA programs. She is working with Gibson Chamber of Commerce on community outreach and has AgTeach conference to find trends upcoming in ag fields and how WIOA can help in future. Any employers in the area currently hiring should contact Cheyenne.

Angel Crawford, Executive Director for Iroquois Economic Development Association provided a copy of her report as she could not attend the meeting.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on July 28, 2022 at 9:00 A.M. Members present were County Board Chairman John Shure, Charlie Alt, Roger Bard and Barbara Offill.

Lyle Behrends and Michael McTaggart were absent. Also present, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, County Clerk Breein Suver, EMA Director Eric Ceci and ETS Director Eric Raymond.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Roger Bard and seconded by Barbara Offill to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a roll call vote.

There were no public comments.

The Committee Chairs gave their monthly reports:

- Health chairman Barbara Offill reported the Health committee will hear their standard reports.
- Tax/Planning & Zoning chairman Roger Bard reported the department heads will give their reports.
- Highway chairman Charlie Alt reported the Highway committee will review their standard reports.

EMA Director Eric Ceci reported he has not heard back from Illinois Emergency Management Agency or Federal Emergency Management Agency on the grant to have a hazard mitigation plan rewritten. EMA had a booth at the Iroquois County Fair last week. Brochures were handed out as well as pamphlets about the HyperReach system and safety and awareness. The weather radar was active with storms this past weekend.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson gave an update on the sexual harassment training. This year there is a video for all employees to watch and a certificate to be signed and returned. Employees may also watch the video on their own time. Current completion rate is at 52%. Johnson is planning to hold other sessions after the County Board Meetings in the future to allow board members to complete their training.

The County's personnel policy manual had been submitted for review to ICRMT, the County's liability carrier. It has since been returned with comments and suggestions. Johnson had emailed the committee a copy of the reviewed policy. A representative from ICRMT has been contacted and is scheduled to attend next month's meeting. Johnson also explained that there were sample policies provided. The committee discussed the first twenty-seven pages and had the following questions to be asked:

- Could the word reasonable be defined and who makes that decision in policy 1002
- How is the word hardship decided in review of providing for a disabled employee in policy 1002
- Who considers when the accommodation is considered a financial hardship on the County in policy 1002
- Who makes the decision on to when an employee is being unsatisfactory in the working environment in policy 1002
- Clarifying policy 1003 and not necessarily stating Covid-19.
- Is there a different statement regarding time limitations and the language of occurrence in policy 1003
- Defining what typical means in policy 1003
- Is there clarification on those Union employees who are fair share regarding at will employment policy 1004

Appointments will be made at the County Board Meeting.

Correspondence was reviewed.

There were no claims to review.

There was no old business.

MIKE TILSTRA, CEO, IROQUOIS MEMORIAL HOSPITAL

Chairman Shure introduced Mike Tilstra, CEO of Iroquois Memorial Hospital. Mr. Tilstra explained how IMH is working through and out of COVID. They are working on growing the foot print of the hospital. Currently, there are several clinics all within a 20-mile radius, including a clinic in Kentland, IN. Tilstra explained how the hospital is taking control of the ER by managing the doctors and there is now a prompt care located at the hospital which is about 60% of the volume of the ER. He thanked the County Board for the ARPA funds the hospital has received, stating the monies are intended for the pharmacy dispensing unit, helipad, and negative pressure room. He talked about the hospital taking over the meal program at the Iroquois County Jail, which has been a smooth transition. Chairman Shure questioned about the clinic in Kentland IN, to which Mr. Tilstra addressed saying it is good to bring business from outside the County to IMH. He added that IMH needs more volume and Kentland needs a clinic.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on August 1, 2022 at 9:00 A.M. Members present Lyle Behrends, Paul Ducat, Kevin Bohlmann, Paul Bowers and John Zumwalt. Donna Crow and Sherry Johnson were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Treasurer Kurt Albers, Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake, ETS Director Eric Raymond, Larry Mahoney with T&T Construction and John Martin with Martin Development & Construction, Inc.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Paul Bowers and seconded by Kevin Bohlmann to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake's report included the following:

- Last Friday, the Illinois Fire Marshal came to recertify the boiler. The gentleman performing the re-certification alerted Drake that the boiler is exempt and does not need re-certified. Other re-certifications include the fire alarm system at the Administrative Center, Courthouse and Jail.
- General maintenance issues include repair to the women's restroom at the Courthouse and repairs to toilet in an inmate cell that won't stop flushing.
- Drake has been asked to construct a false wall on wheels to protect the camera used for telehealth.
- Drake reported on issues with the elevator at the Courthouse stating the elevator has been losing hydraulic fluid since October 2021. Otis Elevator provided pricing for repair. Drake also reached out to 3 other vendors for quotes. Thyssen Krupp will be meeting with Drake this week. It was suggested during Finance budget hearings for Drake to submit an application to the ARPA committee. Paul Ducat disagreed with the use of ARPA funds for this project and also recommended the Finance committee begin discussion on creating a fund for building a new Courthouse and Jail.

The County Farm tile work project was discussed. No bids for the project were received. The bids will be re-published and bids will be opened during the September meeting.

Also during County Farm discussion, John Zumwalt discussed bids for lime for the County Farm. It was moved by Zumwalt and seconded by Ducat to put lime for the County Farm out for bid. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Discussion was held on the building of a Morgue. Last month the committee approved the low bid but the total project amount increased when further discussion was had during the County Board meeting due to the cost of locating utilities. Larry Mahoney with T&T Construction explained some of the numbers have been inflated and none of the utilities have been discovered which also increases the total. John Martin with Martin Development & Construction, Inc. told the committee his cost is valid for 30 days or possibly longer based upon the cost of supplies. Ducat suggested the committee look into Dr. Youssef's old building. The building is in a flood zone. Ducat said he would also like to enter into an agreement with Kankakee County to hold our animals in case of an emergency, such as a flood. The committee expressed their interest in viewing the property. It was moved by Ducat and seconded by Zumwalt to authorize County Board Chairman John Shure to negotiate a contract or appoint someone to negotiate a contract for the Animal Control building. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried. Finance Manager Jill

Johnson informed the committee an invoice from The Design Group in the amount of \$14,575 was received and would like direction on where to pay this from. Johnson suggested the invoice be paid from Administrative Fees, General Fund Maintenance or Capital Improvements. The invoice is for developing construction documents for bidding, preparing bid documents for general construction bidding, preparing legal for bidding and preparing invitations to bid for local contractors for the Iroquois County Morgue. Ducat confirmed with Mahoney that when discussions began on the building, Mahoney said he would not charge the County for his services. It was moved by Ducat and seconded by Bowers to table payment of invoice to The Design Group in the amount of \$14,575. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee discussed security at the Administrative Center. Treasurer Kurt Albers has received a proposal from Ruder Technologies and is waiting on an additional proposal from another vendor. The committee will wait for the other proposal and revisit the matter next month.

The next Management Services committee meeting has been rescheduled for September 7th at 1:00 P.M. at the Courthouse due to the Labor Day holiday.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Zumwalt and seconded by Bohlmann to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

During old business, ETS Director Eric Raymond noted the committee began discussion last month on the phone bill for his department. Also, conversations need to begin about their lease agreement.

During new business, Ducat asked that the Finance committee look into funding the elevator project from the public safety tax fund.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Zumwalt and seconded by Ducat to adjourn at 10:53 A.M. Motion carried.

DISCUSSION AND ACTION ON THE PURCHASE OF REAL ESTATE FOR THE ANIMAL CONTROL BUILDING

The Board began discussion regarding the proposed building for Animal Control. Chairman Shure presented a contract to purchase the building in Watseka that is owned by the former Animal Control Administrator, Dr. Yousseff. The purchase price for the building in the contract is \$60,000. Chairman Shure said he negotiated the contract for the County Board to purchase the building with everything inside in working order. Mrs. Offill questioned why we have changed direction from building a new building to purchasing this building. Mr. Ducat responded due to cost savings, as a new building is upwards of \$400,000 and this building is \$60,000. Flooding is a big concern with the purchase of this building, with several Board members worried about the cost of flood insurance since it is in the floodplain. Chairman Shure stated he spoke with Russell Bills whom has lived and owns a business just a couple blocks from the building. Mr. Bills said the building has flooded twice in the past with a few inches of water. It was noted that additional costs may be incurred to install a dog run outside the building. Many

Board members voiced concerns about purchasing the building without knowing actual cost. There were some that voiced concerns regarding the purchase of two buildings and asked if the proposed morgue was going to be part of this building. If that was the case, they would not be in favor of the purchase because they felt it would be a bigger issue to have the morgue located in an area known for flooding. It was noted that those discussions for the morgue could happen at a future date, but today the Board was looking at the purchase for Animal Control and not the morgue. It was moved by Mr. Coughenour and seconded to send back to committee pending the specifics of expense totals, including the clean up cost should the building flood, flood insurance, confirmation of a deal in place with Kankakee County in case of flood for animals, upon inspection paid by the County. Mrs. Crow amended the motion to send the purchase of the building back to the committee pending the specifics of the expense of the proposed contract and in the meantime contact realtors to research additional properties that would be suitable for the Animal Control Building. The motion was seconded and failed by a roll call vote.

Your Committee to whom was referred **Health** would beg leave to submit the following report on the matters before them:

Your committee met at the Administrative Center on August 2, 2022 at 9:00 A.M. Members present were Roger Bard, Jed Whitlow and John Shure. Barbara Offill, Kevin Coughenour and Ernie Curtis were absent. Also present, ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert and Finance Manager Jill Johnson.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by John Shure and seconded by Jed Whitlow to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Shure and seconded by Whitlow to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There were no public comments.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson reported there are 7 open cases. Information is being gathered for State's Attorney Jim Devine and Sheriff Clint Perzee regarding a pit bull breeding case in LaHogue. There is 1 dog bite case open. The registration deposit for the month of July was \$6,085. The Animal Control Officer's closed 21 cases.

ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert reviewed the summary report of programs with the committee. Environmental Health performed 8 inspections, issued 33 temporary permits, received 1 plan submittal, 1 reopening and 1 food complaint investigation. There were 23 water samples received in July with 9 samples coming back as unsatisfactory. There were 2 new well inspections, issued 4 permits for new wells, issued 7 permits for sealed wells and performed 6 sealed well inspections. Environmental Health also performed 5 private sewage disposal inspections and issued 6 permits. There was 1 garbage waste hauler inspection in July. West Nile surveillance consisted of 50 mosquito samples being collected and tested. All tests have come back negative for West Nile. There were 11 tobacco compliance inspections, distributed 12 radon kits, investigated 1 nuisance complaint and performed 1 tanning inspection. Community Health administered 111 childhood immunizations, 6 adult immunizations, 1 pneumonia vaccine and 49 COVID-19 vaccinations. There were 7 animal bites. There were 3 rabies cases reported and all tests were negative. Community Health gave 12 one-step tuberculosis skin tests and 1 two-step tuberculosis skin test. They also gave 17 hypertension screenings and 1 international travel consultation. Schippert stated the international travel consultations provide important information to the traveler regarding the area they are travelling to. These items include vaccines that are needed to get in and out of that country, diseases that are prevalent, any unrest in the country, high crime areas and locations for money conversion. Community Outreach events consisted of 9 educational presentations. The Breast and Cervical Cancer Program added 3 new clients to their services. There were 9 inmates at the Jail assessed and one inmate was referred for follow-up. The Community Care Program is currently serving 191 total clients.

There are currently no monkeypox cases in Iroquois County. In our region, Champaign County is the only County with a monkeypox case. Schippert explained symptoms of monkeypox include flu-like symptoms and a rash. Sores develop from the rash and are similar to chicken pox. Monkeypox is usually not fatal and is not easily spread. The spread of monkeypox consists of skin-to-skin contact and some cases have been linked to bedding. A vaccine is available in Champaign County.

Roger Bard asked Schippert to provide an update on the Farmers Market bill that had been passed. Schippert said the new legislation goes into effect on January 1, 2023. The Board of Health will determine if the public hearing will be held during a regularly scheduled Board of Health meeting and public comments will be open to hear what individuals believe are fair and reasonable fees. The notice of public hearing will also be published in the newspaper. There is a rate cap of \$175. The Board of Health is responsible for setting these fees. There are also other fee options for vendors selling different items.

County Board Chairman John Shure informed Schippert that Sheriff Clint Perzee will be housing inmates from Champaign County. Shure asked if ICPHD will be assessing these inmates when they arrive. Schippert stated she was not aware of this arrangement but will speak with her Board of Health and with Perzee. Finance Manager Jill Johnson added that the inmates will be assessed prior to their transfer and any other medical assessments or medical needs they have will be paid for by Champaign County. ICPHD does not charge a fee to the County for assessment of inmates, this is a free service that is provided.

Schippert gave an update on COVID-19 reporting a total of 7,985 cases. There were 246 lab confirmed cases in July with 52 lab confirmed cases last week. Schippert said there is a CDC calculator online that you are able to enter your illness dates and the website will tell you how long you need to quarantine if you've tested positive. COVID-19 vaccination statistics are as follows:

- 13,550 doses have been administered

- 49.09% of Iroquois County is fully vaccinated; over 50% has had at least one dose
- Ages 5-11: 10.64% is fully vaccinated and 12.36% has had at least one dose
- Ages 12-17: 29.78% is fully vaccinated and 31.63% has had at least one dose
- Ages 18-64: 50.96% is fully vaccinated and 54.01% has had at least one dose
- 65+: 78.29% is fully vaccinated and 81.40% has had at least one dose

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Whitlow and seconded by Shure to adjourn at 9:32 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your Committee met at the Courthouse on August 3, 2022 at 3:07 P.M. Members present were Lyle Behrends, Paul Ducat, Laverne Boettcher and Jed Whitlow. Chad McGinnis was absent. Also present, County Board Chairman John Shure, Sheriff Clint Perzee, Coroner Bill Cheatum, Probation Supervisor Barb King, State's Attorney Jim Devine and ETS Director Eric Raymond.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Jed Whitlow and seconded by Paul Ducat to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Sheriff Clint Perzee presented his monthly report to the committee as follows:

- Telecourt/Telehealth project: Jail is up and running. Courthouse equipment is installed and will also be up and running. Telehealth with Iroquois Memorial Hospital has started. Mental Health and Addiction Recovery Services will begin soon. Perzee said research is being done on the possibility of having weekend bond hearings on this system so the Judges, State's Attorney and Public Defenders will not have to be physically present.
- Body scanner has been selected and we should be taking delivery in late August.
- Two deputies will be graduating the academy on August 12th and will start their 8 week field training program.
- Mandated training: Sheriff's Department will be providing their own in-house active shooter training for deputies and local departments soon.
- Possibly providing a location for ALICE (Alert Lockdown Inform Counter Evacuate) training in which we will be able to have 2 officers trained for free.
- 51 arrests/intakes in July (38 male, 6 female, 7 male juveniles)
- July Jail population (average 22): 23 (18 male, 2 female, 2 juvenile males housed in Danville). 1 on ankle bracelet.
- July medical: 12 hospital/emergency room/prompt care visits this month, 1 mental health visit to the jail, 0 lab visits by Iroquois Memorial Hospital, 8 nurse practitioner visits (every other Thursday), 7 public health intake exams (every Thursday), 0 telephone assessment with Iroquois Memorial Hospital nurse practitioner for MAR, 0 dentist visits, 2 orthopedic visits at Gibson Orthopedics, 0 Recovery Concepts Urbana (methadone), 6 telehealth with nurse practitioner, 0 rheumatologist in Bradley, IL.
- Jail overtime for July = 324 hours (244 hours paid, 80.25 hours to comp)
- Part-time hours for July = 38
- Received a quote from SecureTech Systems for the panic button alarm system. The initial quote came in at \$36,884 and a revised quote for \$30,319. Perzee said he will be requesting another quote at a lesser amount. The system will encompass the Administrative Center and will be able to notify offices of a lockdown or a similar situation with a text message or email.

Coroner Bill Cheatum reported 2 overdoses in July. These have not been confirmed yet. A fatal accident occurred by Iroquois Paving involving a motorcycle and a semi-truck. Also, a gentleman passed away at Iroquois Memorial Hospital after being found unresponsive at Casey's. Cheatum said no family was able to be located for the man and after exhausting all options, he was cremated. A bill for the cremation will be submitted next month.

Probation Supervisor Barb King reviewed the Probation & Court Services activity report for July with the committee.

ETS Director Eric Raymond distributed his monthly report to the committee. Raymond informed the committee the vacant telecommunicator position will be filled on August 5th.

There was no old business.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on July 26, 2022 at 9:00 A.M. Members present were Michael McTaggart, Charlie Alt, Steve Huse and Joe Young. Paul Bowers, Ernie Curtis and Sherry Johnson were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Superintendent of Veterans Assistance Jennifer Ingram, County Clerk Breein Suver, Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler, Treasurer Kurt Albers, Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake, ETS Director Eric Raymond and County Engineer Joel Moore.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Charlie Alt and seconded by Joe Young to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson presented Fund 815 County Mental Health to the committee. The requested amount of \$600,000 is up from fiscal year 2021 by \$15,000.

County Clerk Breein Suver presented her budget to the committee as follows:

- Salary increases for the deputy clerks reflect the AFSCME contract plus an additional 1.5% increase and Suver requested her Chief Deputy's salaries be increased to \$35,000 and \$36,000. She explained that there are no beginning salary requirements for this position and one department is going to have an opening.
- Election Judges Salary is being requested at \$29,000, Ballots & Supplies at \$57,000 and Training decreased from \$6,000 to \$3,000 due to there being one election in 2023. Suver also expressed that the election judges' salaries be increased \$25. She shared the difficulty in finding judges and believes this may help. The last increase was in 2018.
- Revenue for County Clerk Fees is estimated at \$3,000 and Automation Expenses at \$3,000.
- Recorder Fees were increased to \$48,000. Automation Expenses for County Recorder is budgeted at \$95,000. The increase is due to public records preservation. The transfer to the General Fund is negotiable.
- Suver informed the committee that there will be no HAVA grant due to the election not being a federal election. She also shared that the IVRS grant award FY23 will be in the amount of \$29,653.

Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler presented his budget to the committee:

- Salary was put in at the amount of \$50,000 for a Zoning Administrator.
- Yergler increased inspections and the mileage and travel expenses to reflect rising costs.
- The Chief Deputy salary is requested at \$36,000 and Yergler also asked for the Deputy Clerks' salaries to be increased 1.5%.
- The education and dues line were increased to \$3,500 from \$2,000. Yergler has an employee that he would like to put in some classes to prepare for his retirement.
- Board of Review is requested to stay the same.
- Yergler expressed that he would like to complete a flyover to be paid out of the GIS fund in the near future.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson presented her budget to the committee:

- Johnson requested a salary increase to \$62,000 and \$44,000 for the Administrative Assistant salary. She explained the many duties shared by herself and Amanda Longfellow.
- Systems Expense decreased from \$62,500 to \$50,000.
- Software Contracts decreased to \$70,000 due to server replacements and not having to pay for extended warranties. Other Items paid from this line item include monthly AreaWide charges, quarterly Devnet charges, annual payroll licensing, annual Animal Control licensing and annual website hosting.
- Service Contracts decreased to \$35,000 for onsite AreaWide visits and other AreaWide tickets.
- Group Insurance includes an increase based upon the 9.9% rate cap with Blue Cross Blue Shield.
- Johnson increased the County Farm expense to accommodate the increases of prices to \$102,581.29. The transfer to County Capital Improvement increased to \$100,000.
- The 377 Board has requested the maximum allowed to be budgeted which amounts to \$692,058.
- Historical Documents transfer increased to \$20,000.
- Cooperative Extension has requested \$111,300.
- The County Board budget includes an increase in auditor fees due to the single audit.
- The Regional Office of Education has requested \$81,030.
- Transfer to Joint Dispatch is budgeted at \$120,000. Transfer to Capital Improvements is budgeted at \$250,000. Johnson explained the fund currently sits at \$85,772.09 and she would like the transfer to increase the fund for future projects.

Treasurer Kurt Albers presented his budget to the committee:

- Albers reviewed revenue amounts with the committee.
- He explained that there will be an opening with his current Chief Deputy retiring at the end of the fiscal year. Albers stated that he was considering offering a starting salary of \$36,000.
- Salary increases reflect the AFSCME contract.
- Office Expense decreased to \$4,200 from \$6,000.

- Postage increased from \$55,000 to \$60,000.
- The County Treasurer Automation is to remain the same.

Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake presented his budget to the committee:

- Drake decreased his service contracts line by \$3,000 but left everything else the same.
- He reviewed the capital project plan and asked to keep the heat pumps at \$20,000, to move the parking lot and cooling tower project and to put on the courthouse elevator at \$230,000.

911 Director Eric Raymond presented his budget to the committee:

- Raymond began with the Joint Dispatch budget which consists mostly of the Telecommunicators salaries.
- Transfer to Fire, Volunteer Ambulance and Police has increased by 5%. Transfer from General Fund, City of Watseka and 911 is budgeted at \$155,333.25.
- As of now, a budgeted amount of \$150,000 is requested from Public Safety for the use of salaries.
- Raymond stated the 911 budget has not been finalized by the ETSB Board. Wireless contributions have decreased from \$540,000 to \$520,000. The Transfer from Sheriff is budgeted at \$6,000.
- Raymond requested a salary increase but expects this to decrease.
- Raymond plans on asking for an assistant department head and for that salary to be set at \$45,000. He explained that the assistant would be utilized for supervision of the telecommunicators, training and to fill in on the radio if needed.
- Purchase of Equipment is budgeted at \$207,250.30.
- Raymond has a contingency budget of \$17,039.02.
- The ETSB Board meets on Wednesday to review the proposed budget.

County Engineer Joel Moore presented his budget to the committee:

- Moore stated that the salary increases are requested in order to attract employees and to help retain current employees. He provided a report comparing the salaries to other surrounding highway departments.
- Repairs and Shop Supplies increased from \$90,000 to \$125,000.
- Road Supplies decreased to \$250,000.
- Asphalt Emulsion increased from \$24,000 to \$74,000.
- Purchase of Equipment decreased by \$25,000.
- The County Bridge fund includes an increase to culvert replacements.
- Matching Tax increased from \$290,000 to \$320,000. Moore explained that there are three projects planned for the upcoming fiscal year.
- County Motor Fuel Tax includes a decrease to Contractors & Supplies from \$1,900,000 to \$500,000. The decrease is due to the lack of vendor availability.

After budget presentations, the committee discussed possible changes. Johnson said she will get in touch with Moore to further review his budget worksheets. Johnson will also complete a salary analysis, update the capital planning sheet and send notification for the Fraternal Order of Police union contract negotiations.

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Young and seconded by Steve Huse to adjourn at 11:50 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote. All of which is respectfully submitted.

Ernie Curtis and Sherry Johnson were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Judge Mike Sabol, Coroner Bill Cheatum, State's Attorney Jim Devine, Sheriff Clint Perzee, Probation Director Tom Latham and Circuit Clerk Lisa Hines.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Steve Huse and seconded by Joe Young to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Judge Mike Sabol presented his budget to the committee:

- Judge Sabol requested a salary increase for his Chief Deputy to \$37,000.

Jill Johnson reviewed the animal control budget to the committee:

- Johnson decreased animal care to \$24,000 from \$28,000.
- It is being requested to increase Service Contracts to \$35,000 due to the added expenditures in placing animals.

Coroner Bill Cheatum presented his budget to the committee:

- Cheatum does not anticipate any changes to his budget over the next year.

State's Attorney Jim Devine presented his budget to the committee:

- Devine explained the difficulty of hiring and retaining employees in his office. He discussed acquiring a grant through the Harbor House to employ a victim coordinator for twenty hours a week. A Deputy Clerk has been hired for the position and to work the additional fifteen hours in Devine's office.
- The Drug Free Communities Fund is a 5 year grant. The two employees work with the schools and in the community promoting the Tip the Scale campaign as well as other advertising.

Sheriff Clint Perzee presented his budget to the committee:

- Salaries are set per the FOP contract.
- Sheriff discussed the promotion of a deputy to sergeant and one of the sergeants to lieutenant.
- Gas and Oil expenses increased by \$50,000 due to the increase in gas prices.
- Training increase from \$10,000 to \$15,000 due to mandated training.
- Gym Membership Reimbursement is requested at \$2,000.
- Diet of Prisoners increased from \$65,000 to \$101,407.95 due to switching vendors to Iroquois Memorial Hospital. Sheriff explained that they prepare two hot meals and one cold meal.
- Perzee informed the committee that he had signed a contract with the Champaign Sheriff's office to house up to eight inmates at \$60 per day per person. Champaign Sheriff is closing one of its facility and temporarily needs to place its inmates.
- Sheriff is requesting \$300,000 from the Public Safety Fund for the purchase of 4 new vehicles. Perzee is also requesting one deputy's salary to come out of the Public Safety Fund at a cost of \$48,883.70
- The Sheriff's Public Safety Fund can be used as an automation fund.
- The Arrestee's Medical Costs Fund is budgeted at \$5,000 on the revenue side.
- Court Security Fund includes salary and benefits for the Court Security Officer and Perzee is requesting a 4% salary increase for the position.

Probation Director Tom Latham presented his budget to the committee:

- Salary increases are set by the FOP contract.
- Salary reimbursements are budgeted at \$401,700

Circuit Clerk Lisa Hines presented her budget to the committee:

- Salary increases are set by the AFSCME contract. Hines explained that she plans to negotiate her employees contract separately. She is requesting a 7% increase for the Deputy Clerks.
- Chief Deputy salary is being requested to increase 13%.
- Court Document Storage includes a \$30,000 transfer to the General Fund.
- Circuit Clerk Automation includes a \$30,000 transfer to the General Fund.
- Fund 345, Unclaimed Bonds, is not needed any longer as the revenues go to the State in lieu of the County.

In preparation for the next Finance meeting, Johnson will make the necessary adjustments as discussed and provide a salary analysis.

There was no old business.

Michael McTaggart stressed the importance to place a verification process of overtime discussion put on the Finance agenda.

Ernie Curtis and Sherry Johnson were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Sheriff Clint Perzee, County Clerk Breein Suver, ETS Director Eric Raymond, EMA Director Eric Ceci, Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake, Myron Munyon with Compass Insurance, Ginger Boas with U of I Extension and Bernie McCarty with AreaWide.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Paul Bowers and seconded by Charlie Alt to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Myron Munyon with Compass Insurance reported the cyber security policy is up for renewal. Munyon has asked Illinois Counties Risk Management Trust (ICRMT) to provide a quote and expects to have the quote by next month's Finance meeting.

Bernie McCarty with AreaWide reported all major projects are complete. He is currently working with Finance Manager Jill Johnson on budget items for FY23. McCarty also said AreaWide can review the cyber security policy. Joe Young added that he gave McCarty contact information for an internet vendor. Young said they could be used as a backup if the County's internet fails again.

The department heads gave their monthly reports. They are as follows:

- County Clerk Breein Suver reported she is working on the request for proposal for election equipment. Bids will be opened at the Finance committee meeting and sent to the American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) committee for funding approval. The County Clerk's office is also preparing for a required mailing notifying registered voters in the County of their ability to sign up for permanent vote by mail status. Suver stated that voters do not have to sign up.
- Finance Manager Jill Johnson reported the auditors have all documents required to finish the single audit. Johnson continues to work on the FY23 budget.
- Sheriff Clint Perzee reported he met with a Motorola representative and viewed a coverage map with optional tower locations. This doesn't provide full coverage on the Starcom system but with the cellular/wifi option of the portable radios, it would bridge the gap. Perzee added this would be a costly venture. KC Communications is also looking for a better solution to the existing system. There have been 64 instances since April 13th where ICOM has had to contact an officer on their cell

phone to reestablish contact and check their status. The phone system upgrade between the Sheriff's Office, Jail and ICOM to the same system as the Courthouse and Administrative Center is ongoing. A price was received for the wiring at \$6,400 with the total package costing \$12,346. Perzee said this is in the capital expense line. Perzee has reached out to the SecureTech regarding pricing on the panic button system. The amount of physical buttons has been reduced within the buildings SecureTech has reduced their initial quote but Perzee requested a lesser amount. Their final price came in at \$28,019. Perzee said this system will allow for office holders to receive text messages or emails alerting them of issues in the buildings. He would also like to add a panic button for the transport vehicle. Two deputies will be graduating from the academy on August 12th. The contracts for Cissna and Buckley will be available for next month's Finance meeting. The Sheriff's Department has purchased the Cissna Park squad car for \$6,500. The vehicle has 76,842 miles and is fully equipped. The body x-ray scanner should be here at the end of August or early September. There is one correctional officer out on medical IMRF short term disability. This is creating a strain on scheduling and costing overtime. Perzee requests authorization to move one part-time correctional officer to full-time pay status due to the short term disability salary not coming out of the current budget. The telehealth/telecourt systems are active and being used. Perzee said he believes this system will help with weekend bonds in 2023. Finance/I.T. chairman Michael McTaggart suggested the transfer of a part-time employee wait until the new budget year.

The public safety tax plan is not finalized and will continue to be discussed in future meetings.

Johnson informed the committee of Treasurer Kurt Albers request to add Edward Jones to the investment policy. Johnson said Edward Jones is able to offer a much higher interest rate on a 90 day certificate of deposit than local banks. Suver reminded the committee that with this change, they may need to add Edward Jones to the depository list. It was moved by Bowers and seconded by Steve Huse to add Edward Jones to the investment policy. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake explained his request on funding the elevator at the Courthouse. Drake has received quotes from 2 vendors. One of the vendors is also putting together pricing for a jack replacement and door control package. Drake noted the controls that operate the elevator are fine. The matter was discussed at the Management committee meeting and there was some opposition on submitting an application to the ARPA committee. The Finance committee agreed that Drake should proceed with submitting an application to the ARPA committee.

Continued discussion on the FY23 budget was held as follows:

- Ginger Boas with the U of I Extension presented their annual budget plan with a request of \$111,300 from Iroquois County. Boas said their request pays the salaries in the local office. U of I Extension also receives matching funds from other entities such as the Farm Bureau and the Extension Council.
- EMA Director Eric Ceci presented his budget to the committee. Ceci is requesting an increase in mileage to cover hotel and food expenses for conferences. An increase in gas and oil was requested due to rising gas prices. Maintenance of autos was increased to repair the air conditioning in Ceci's vehicle. Ceci also requested a salary increase from \$21,578 to \$23,520. Ceci provided salary statistics from the

Bureau of Labor which shows Ceci's current salary well below the average amount. Ceci is a part-time employee for the County with 8 years experience. If approved, the salary increase will still leave his salary below the average. Ceci's salary is 50% reimbursable. Ceci also discussed adding paid staff to the EMA department.

- ETS Director Eric Raymond discussed his budget stating the biggest challenge right now is salaries for the telecommunicators. Salary negotiations begin this year for the new contract. It was suggested that McTaggart, County Board Chairman John Shure and Johnson attend the next ETSB meeting to further discuss their budget.

Overall, McTaggart said the main budget issue is deciding on salaries. This year there have been a wide range of salary increases that need to be reviewed. There is also the matter of the Champaign County prisoner agreement that is currently budgeted at \$75,000 that needs to be reviewed further. Lastly, McTaggart mentioned the administrative fees that the Highway Department pays for payroll related items. McTaggart said the health department and the Board of Health should assist in paying for payroll costs and costs for the single audit. McTaggart will have a follow up conversation with Johnson regarding these items.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Alt and seconded by Joe Young to pay the claims subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There was no old business.

During new business, Bowers said a member of the Management committee meeting requested the County Board begin a fund for the building of a new Courthouse and Jail. McTaggart said the Finance committee is currently working on a deficit budget for FY23. He will not propose new taxes for the funding of a new Courthouse and Jail.

Also during new business, Shure informed the committee that the Management committee had further discussion on the Animal Control building and determined the cost far exceeds what was originally planned for. A motion was made during the meeting to allow Shure to negotiate a contract. Members of the committee viewed the facility previous occupied by Dr. Youssef and agreed the building would suffice. An offer was put in and accepted for \$60,000 for the 2,600 square foot building which also includes all equipment in the building. Shure has signed necessary paperwork subject to approval by the County Board. Munyon will be in contact regarding the required insurance for the building.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Alt and seconded by Bowers to adjourn at 10:25 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on August 5, 2022 at 10:02 A.M. Members present were Paul Ducat, Charlie Alt, Donna Crow and John Shure. Barbara Offill was absent. Also present, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, County Board member Joe Young, Village of Buckley representatives Keith Hethke, Donald Miller, Evan Shockley and Peggy Shockley, City of Gilman representative Rick Theesfeld, Christ Lutheran High School representatives Sandy Spitz and Les Dippel, CrossRoads Youth Center representative Harlan Ziebart and Bread Basket Food Pantry representative Sonia Bradley.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by John Shure and seconded by Donna Crow to amend the agenda to include application #58 for the Animal Control building. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

The committee began their review of the ARPA applications as follows:

- Application #34 – Bread Basket Food Pantry. Sonia Bradley submitted quotes for 2 freezers per the committee’s request. The committee noted the quotes do not state where the freezers are from. Shure added one of the freezers received poor ratings. Ms. Bradley stated the freezers are from Lowe’s and Walmart.com. It was requested that Ms. Bradley attempt to receive quotes from local vendors, if possible. The Bread Basket Food Pantry’s hours are 5:00 P.M. until 7:00 P.M. on Thursday’s. She will submit the new quotes to Finance Manager Jill Johnson.
- Application # 47 – City of Gilman. Their application in the amount of \$250,000 is for replacement of sewer system lines. Mayor Rick Theesfeld explained the City of Gilman’s sanitary sewer system was built in the 1930’s. Throughout the years the sewer gases have eaten away at the concrete tile. The City has been very proactive in replacing sewer mains and main trunk lines. The City is in the process of obtaining a 2.4 million dollar loan from the EPA to do the last section of the main trunk line. One section is approximately 500 feet in length and approximately 20 feet in depth. The City of Gilman provided the committee with two quotes. Ducat asked Mayor Theesfeld to provide the committee with their gross revenue. Also, their request is much larger than others that have been approved. Ducat asked if a portion of their request was approved, would this help with their project. Mayor Theesfeld answered the project is on their list to do regardless of the funding they receive.
- Application #50 – CrossRoads Youth Center. Their application in the amount of \$30,340 is to fund the building of a new center. The hours of the facility is 3:30 P.M. until 5:30 P.M., four days per week. It was moved by Crow and seconded by Shure to adopt a resolution approving CrossRoads Youth Center’s application in the amount of \$30,340. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.
- Application #76 – Hometown Family Foods-Gilman. Their application in the amount of \$17,748 is to fund parking lot repair. The committee requested a representative attend the next ARPA meeting and also provide pictures of their parking lot.

- Application #79 – Christ Lutheran High School. Their application in the amount of \$28,550 is for loss of revenue/loan repayment. Sandy Spitz with Christ Lutheran High School provided the committee with information regarding the school. She said they were able to team up with Dairy Queen to distribute senior meals in the Buckley area. Meals were also delivered in the Loda area. This program was able to continue throughout the pandemic. Bids were also provided to the committee for repairs to the roof and walls. It was moved by Shure and seconded by Ducat to adopt a resolution approving Christ Lutheran’s application in the amount of \$46,500. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.
- Application #89 & #90 – Village of Clifton. Their applications totaling \$99,800 is for sewer sludge removal and water tower cleaning and pumps. The committee requests two bids for these projects and a representative attend the next meeting.
- Application #66, #93 & #94 – Village of Buckley. Their applications are for light poles, extend/loop water main and drainage tile. After brief conversation, it was decided that the highest priority project is the drainage tile. Ducat requested a second quote for the project.
- Application #58 – Animal Control. The application in the amount of \$65,000 is for the purchase of a building. Shure said the Management committee discussed the options of building a new building for Animal Control and the Morgue but the concern is the exceedingly high costs. The Animal Control facility owned by Dr. Youssef was considered. The Management committee made a motion to allow Shure to negotiate a contract for the building. The committee also visited the property and came to the conclusion it fits the County’s animal control needs. Johnson and Coroner Bill Cheatum also visited the facility. On Wednesday, Shure put together an offer to purchase the building for \$60,000 and the offer was approved. The purchase is subject to County Board approval on Tuesday, August 9th. Crow was not at the Management meeting but expressed her disagreement with the purchase of this building. She stated this purchase is irresponsible and burdensome due to the property sitting directly in a flood plain. Crow added the building is inaccessible during a flood and per FEMA, the building cannot be added on to. Crow agrees that the building new buildings is not feasible but perhaps members of the committee could reach out to realtors about upcoming buildings for sale. Crow said she is willing to work on this. Crow asked that the purchase of this building be put on hold and allow time to look at other properties.
