OUTSIDE ORGANIZATION REPORTS

Angel Crawford, IEDA, Executive Director, spoke of her visit to the Illinois Economic Development Association Summit in Chicago along with an update from Justin Arnold whom is the Champaign County Regional Planning Commission Workforce Director. He is currently working with Kankakee Community College, Danville Area Community College and Parkland College on apprenticeship programs and is hoping to integrate all of the colleges into the CCRPC Workforce programs within the next year.

Cheyenne Denoyer, with Workforce Development, gave an update of the program. She is working with IFF (International Fragrance and Flavor) and putting together a manufacturing tour with schools along with a trade bootcamp at PBL. She has 10 enrollments at KCC, 2 successful CDL completions and 1 pending application for a CDL.

MANAGEMENT SERVICES

Mr. Zumwalt, member of the Management Services Committee, gave the report of the committee. There was general discussion regarding the proposed Animal Control Building and Morgue which are now being considered as two separate buildings. Chairman Shure stated the board is waiting on bids to see the cost. Mr. Bard questioned the tile project at the County Farm and Mr. Zumwalt explained it's at a standstill. Your Committee to whom was referred **Management Services** would beg leave to submit the following report on the matters before them:

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on June 6, 2022 at 9:02 A.M. Members present Lyle Behrends, Paul Ducat, Paul Bowers, Donna Crow and John Zumwalt. Kevin Bohlmann and Sherry Johnson were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake, Coroner Bill Cheatum and Larry Mahoney with T&T Construction.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by John Zumwalt and seconded by Paul Bowers to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake's report included the following:

- The quarterly elevator inspection was completed by Otis.
- Getz performed the Jail kitchen inspection. Drake said the kitchen is not used very frequently at this time because Iroquois Memorial Hospital has been supplying the inmate meals. If Iroquois Memorial Hospital continues to supply the meals, the inspection may not be an ongoing necessity.
- Drake renewed the service contract with Centrica (SmartWatt) for 5 years.
- Drake contacted Freehill Asphalt about the south parking lot at the Courthouse/Jail. Work will begin on the parking lot very soon.
- There was a heat pump issue in the County Clerk's Office involving a thermostat.
- The floors at the Administrative Center were done over the Memorial Day holiday.
- B&D Electric was called to work on a 3-way switch in the Treasurer's Office.
- Drake asked the committee for their suggestions on the fencing around the old headstart play area. He will be clearing out the raised garden beds and planting grass seed.

- Drake received an email from the Allhands family regarding their tree donation. A tentative date of June 8th has been set for the trees to be planted.

The County Farm tile work project was discussed. Zumwalt informed the committee he has been in contact with Dave Johnson and Chris Shires. As of the last meeting, Joda Crabtree was not willing to pay for the main that crosses their 40 acres. In speaking with Mr. Shires, Zumwalt said one way to work this out is to have them pay 10%-15% of the cost of the tile that goes through their land based on the number of acres it would benefit. Zumwalt said the County should prepare to cover the entire cost, minus the 10%-15% of the 40 acres. Moving forward, Zumwalt believes the project is ready to be put out for bid. It was moved by Zumwalt and seconded by Bowers to put the County Farm tiling project out for bid. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Management Chairman Lyle Behrends informed the committee the fertilizer bill in the amount of \$52,319.69 from United Prairie has been received and will be paid this month.

Continued discussion was held on the Animal Control building and the Morgue. Larry Mahoney with T&T Construction provided the committee with construction documents for the morgue. Mahoney stated these drawings are approximately 95% completed. The new proposed site for the location of the morgue is on the south side of the Jail. The committee reviewed the revised drawings with Mr. Mahoney. It was moved by Zumwalt and seconded by Bowers to request bids for the construction of the Iroquois County Morgue once the final details are included in the bid packet. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Plans for the Animal Control building are still in the works. Finance Manager Jill Johnson explained the focus has been shifted onto the building of the morgue. Once final approval is received on the morgue, the committee can continue discussing the Animal Control building. Tentatively, the location of the building will be on the west side of the Administrative Center.

The committee rescheduled the next Management meeting for July 6th at 1:00 P.M. due to the Independence Day holiday.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Zumwalt and seconded by Bowers to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Bowers and seconded by Zumwalt to adjourn at 9:49 A.M. Motion carried.

Your Committee to whom was referred **American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA)** would beg leave to submit the following report on the matters before them:

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on June 6, 2022 at 10:06 A.M. Members present were Paul Ducat, Charlie Alt, Donna Crow, Barbara Offill and John Shure. Also present, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Angie Arseneau and Todd Arseneau with Beaverville Township, James Smith and Julie Pasel with Village of Chebanse, Kena Clark and Brian Zecher with Country

Theatre Workshop, Lisa Hanson, Stephanie Hanson and Krystal Alberts with Ashkum Township and John Marusarz and Monika Sztylec with Addiction Recovery Services.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by John Shure and seconded by Donna Crow to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

During public comments, Kena Clark with Country Theatre Workshop spoke to the committee about the application that was submitted. While their initial request was large, they would like the committee to consider approving a portion to cover the loan they took out for mold remediation.

The committee began their review of the ARPA applications as follows:

- Application #33 – Iroquois County Historical Society. The committee approved their application in the amount of \$166,000 in May. They have also received additional funding through another grant for \$15,000. Finance Manager Jill Johnson has talked with the Historical Society and they will be providing grant documentation.
- Application #27 – Health Chek. The committee approved their application in the amount of \$7,150 in May. Health Chek also received additional grant funding and will be forwarding the documentation to Johnson.
- Application #34 – Bread Basket Food Pantry. They have submitted an application in the amount of \$10,000 for food and inventory supplies. The committee requests additional paperwork from United Way Association and two quotes for the replacement of their freezer.
- Applications #31 & #32 – Iroquois Mental Health Center. Upon further review of their applications, the committee suggested considering their approval at a later date. Their operations extend beyond Iroquois County and some of the funds will be used outside of the County.
- Application #63 – Chebanse Civic Center. Their application in the amount of \$49,999.95 is for roof replacement. The committee reviewed the bids submitted with the application. It was moved by Crow and seconded by Shure to adopt a resolution approving Chebanse Civic Center's application in the amount of \$47,875. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.
- Application # 62 – Chebanse Community Building. Their application in the amount of \$49,999 is for remodeling their restrooms to make them ADA accessible. It was moved by Barbara Offill and seconded by Crow to adopt a resolution approving Chebanse Community Building's application in the amount of \$49,999. A roll call vote was taken. Ducat, abstain; Alt, aye; Crow, aye; Offill, aye; Shure, aye. Motion carried.
- Application #80 – Township of Beaverville. Their application in the amount of \$141,376 is for a cold storage building. It was moved by Crow and seconded by Offill to adopt a resolution approving Township of Beaverville's application in the amount of \$108,993. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.
- Applications #82, #83, #84 & #85– Ashkum Township. Their applications totaling \$176,070 is for a drainage system, HVAC system upgrade, loss of revenue and building repairs. The representatives with Ashkum Township stated the drainage system is the item that needs the most attention. It was moved by Shure and seconded by Offill to adopt a resolution approving Ashkum Township's application

in the amount of \$88,370. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried. Their remaining applications will be reviewed at a later date.

- Applications #89 & #90 – Village of Clifton. Their applications totaling \$99,800 is for sewer sludge removal and water tower cleaning. The committee requested quotes for their items.
- Application #13 – Addiction Recovery Services. The committee has reviewed their application and has tabled action at a later date. Monica Sztylec and John Marusarz with Addiction Recovery Services informed the committee they have an office location at 908 East Cherry Street in Watseka and are currently offering telehealth services.
- Application #81 – Country Theatre Workshop. They have requested \$342,300 for loss of revenue. As stated in public comments, County Theatre Workshop is requesting a lesser amount at this time to assist in paying off a loan for mold remediation. Kena Clark and Brian Zecher with Country Theatre provided the committee with all financial documents. It was moved by Charlie Alt and seconded by Crow to adopt a resolution approving Country Theatre Workshop’s application in the amount of \$57,143. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

The committee discussed rescheduling the July meeting due to the holiday. It was decided to cancel the July meeting. The next ARPA meeting will be held on August 1st at 10:00 A.M. Applications for Crossroads Youth Center, Village of Clifton, Hometown Family Foods, Christ Lutheran High School and Village of Buckley will be reviewed at this meeting.

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Shure and seconded by Crow to adjourn at 12:06 P.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your committee met at the Administrative Center on June 7, 2022 at 9:04 A.M. Members present were Barbara Offill, Roger Bard and John Shure. Kevin Coughenour, Ernie Curtis and Thomas Lynch were absent. Also present, Finance Manager Jill Johnson and ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Roger Bard and seconded by John Shure to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Bard and seconded by Shure to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There were no public comments.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson reported 17 animal control cases closed for the month. There were 7 bite reports closed, 2 dogs returned to their owners, 2 dogs placed with Hospice Hearts, 2 dogs placed with River Valley, 11 cats transferred to ICare, 1 cat euthanized due to injuries sustained from being hit by a vehicle, 1 dog on dog attack was investigated and a pot belly pig was taken to Coats Farm Sanctuary. There are currently 5 open cases which include a cow that is believed to have been hit by a car or fallen off a trailer. The cow is being held in Danforth. Johnson said she has been in contact with Joel Asherman from the Illinois Department of Agriculture regarding the matter. Also, Animal Control is holding 3 dogs (2 pitbulls, 1 husky) and there is one bite case open. Two bats were collected, one tested negative for rabies and we are awaiting results on the other. Iroquois County's Animal Control license has been renewed for another year. Lastly, Johnson updated the committee on the status of the Animal Control building stating the project was somewhat put on hold due to proposed plans for the new Morgue. On Monday, the Management committee approved a motion to put the project out for bid to be opened next month. Further progress on the Animal Control building will resume.

Shure noted the increase in animal control activity and asked if an increase in fees is necessary. Johnson answered that she keeps a close eye on the budget numbers and does not feel there is a need to increase fees at this time.

ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert gave an update on COVID-19 reporting there were 50 new cases last week. During the month of May, there were 159 reported cases. There have been a total of 7,442 lab confirmed cases and 226 deaths associated with COVID-19. COVID-19 vaccination statistics are as follows:

- 48.85% of Iroquois County is fully vaccinated
- Ages 5-11: 11.68%
- Ages 12-17: 31.40%
- Ages 18-64: 53.74%
- 65+: 81.40%

Schippert reviewed the summary report of programs with the committee. Environmental Health collected 14 water samples with 1 sample being unsatisfactory. There were 15 West Nile samples collected and 1 bird sent in for testing. All tests have come back negative for West Nile. There were 28 tobacco compliance inspections conducted and 3 nuisance complaints. Community Health administered 108 COVID-19 vaccines. They investigated 1 animal bite and 3 rabies cases. The rabies tests came back negative for one case, unsatisfactory for the second case and the third test result hasn't been released. There were also 3 COVID-19 outbreaks in long-term care facilities. Community Outreach held 19 educational presentations which included 16 health presentations in schools from kindergarten to 12th grade, 1 safe sitter class, 1 body safety class at the Arc of Iroquois County and 1 Narcan training. One press release was put out asking the community for assistance in collecting dead birds for West Nile surveillance.

Bard noted the confirmed monkeypox case in Illinois and asked Schippert to explain. Schippert monkeypox is a virus very similar to smallpox. Most individuals that are testing positive across the United States are testing positive due to intimate, skin to skin contact. Taking anti-virals within 5 days of exposure will lessen signs and symptoms.

There was no old business.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on June 7, 2022 at 9:36 A.M. Members present were Roger Bard, Barbara Offill and John Shure. Chad McGinnis, Kevin Coughenour and Ernie Curtis were absent. Also present, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Treasurer Kurt Albers, County Clerk Breein Suver, Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler, ICPHD Administrator Dee Schippert, IEDA Director Angel Crawford, Stanley and Lori Henrichs of Ridgeville and Gene Olsen of Ridgeville.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Barbara Offill and seconded by John Shure to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Offill and seconded by Shure to pay the claims subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

During public comments, Stanley and Lori Henrichs of Ridgeville addressed the committee about livestock being brought into their community. When they heard rumors of a new neighbor bringing cows to their land, Mrs. Henrichs contacted Supervisor of Assessments Bob Yergler to ask if this is possible. Mr. Yergler told Mrs. Henrichs they lived in an urban residential zone, therefore no livestock animals. A few weeks later Mr. and Mrs. Henrichs noticed the neighbors

marking their yard with flags for a pasture for their cows. Mrs. Henrichs contact Yergler again and Yergler stated he looked into the matter a little more and the information he initially gave was incorrect. Mr. and Mrs. Henrichs would like to see the County Board make revisions to the ordinance that allows livestock in a residential community. John Hoy of Ridgeville also spoke to the committee about his concerns and agrees the County Board should look into the ordinance.

Tax/Zoning Chairman Roger Bard informed the committee of a recent phone and email scam that took place involving the use of County Board Chairman John Shure's phone number. Bard also received an invoice via email that was also suspicious. Bard confirmed with Shure that the text he received was not a legitimate text. Shure commented that it is unfortunate when this happens and all County Board members emails and phone numbers are listed on the website.

The department heads gave their monthly reports:

- Treasurer Kurt Albers reported the first installment of property tax bills are due June 9th. The Treasurer's Office is receiving many calls about people not receiving their tax bills. Albers said they have been in contact with the post office to find out where the tax bills are and why they haven't been delivered.
- County Clerk Breein Suver reported that early voting and vote by mail has been ongoing. During the even numbered years, the election judges begin a new term and the County Clerk's Office begins gathering the judges' information and information from the precinct committeemen in May. Suver said this year is a little different due to the election being moved, however, the election judges will still have to be approved at the July board meeting. Once approved by the County Board, they will go through the court system for judicial approval. The filing period for Statements of Economic Interest has ended. There are some statements that did not get filed, the names of those individuals will get turned over to the State's Attorney for further action. Suver reported her office is working toward e-recording documents. She said they will start with mortgages and releases and add more document types once they are comfortable with the e-recording process. Lastly, in 2019, a contract was signed with Fidlar that allowed the Recording Office to use a portion of the fees that are collected from remote access clients to pay invoices due to Fidlar. Suver said the Schedule G on the contract needs to be updated to include Bastion invoices which are the invoices for the remote server. This would result in one payment being made to Fidlar for invoices rather than quarterly payments. It was moved by Offill and seconded by Shure to approve the Schedule G for the Fidlar contract, which allows revenues received from Fidlar remote access to offset Fidlar invoices. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.
- Supervisor of Assessment Bob Yergler reported his office is busy answering questions and completing certificates of errors. Yergler has two appointments to be approved at the board meeting. These include Scott Zumwalt to the Farmland Assessment Review Committee and Brad Cosgrove to the Board of Review for a two year term. Yergler also informed the committee of a new law (35 ILCS 200/2-5, 2-10 and 2-15) signed regarding preferential assessments for low income housing. There is an opt-out clause and Yergler recommends the County opt-out. We can opt-in at a later date if there is a need. Lastly, per statute in accordance with the census every 10 years the assessment jurisdictions need to be changed or remain the same based on population. There is a minimum population of 1,000 residents per assessment district. The multi-township of Papineau and Beaverville

fell under the combined population. Yergler has notified the township trustees and supervisors and the township trustees and supervisors of Martinton, Concord and Beaver. Yergler is proposing they join together and become a larger multi-township district after the next election cycle.

Yergler addressed the concerns discussed during public comments. Yergler said the information stated was correct. When he answered their questions, he did not know the ordinance in full. Yergler also apologized for not contacting Mrs. Henrichs to give her updated information.

Suver provided a list of liquor licenses to be approved by the committee. The only change is Shewami Country Club's request to apply for a 1AM license instead of a club license. It was moved by Offill and seconded by Shure to approve the annual liquor licenses. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Suver also provided the committee with a monthly resolution list showing a parcel being sold to the City of Watseka. It was sold at the base price and the County will be receiving \$300 from the sale. It was moved by Offill and seconded by Shure to approve the resolution authorizing the sale of property to the City of Watseka. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

During old business, Bard requested a follow up kennel visit be done on Paulette Waltz. When Ms. Waltz applied for the kennel license, she stated there were no concrete runs but had concrete patio blocks. She assured the committee the concrete would be poured or the patio blocks would be put in. Finance Manager Jill Johnson said she can have one of the wardens follow up and report back.

There was no new business.

Your Committee met at the Courthouse on June 8, 2022 at 3:00 P.M. Members present were Lyle Behrends, Laverne Boettcher and David Penny. Paul Ducat and Chad McGinnis were absent. Also present, County Board Chairman John Shure, Sheriff Clint Perzee, Coroner Bill Cheatum, Probation Supervisor Barb King, Judge Mike Sabol, State's Attorney Jim Devine,

Circuit Clerk Lisa Hines, Court Secretary Jackie Lehmann and Monica Sztylec with Addiction Recovery Services.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by David Penny and seconded by Laverne Boettcher to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

During public comments, Monica Sztylec with Addiction Recovery Services informed the committee of their new office location at 908 E. Cherry St. in Watseka. Telehealth services are being offered at this time and they continue to spread the word about their subscription based services. Ms.Sztylec will provide certifications and other documentation to Judge Mike Sabol and Sheriff Clint Perzee as requested.

Sheriff Clint Perzee presented his monthly report to the committee as follows:

- Two deputies progressing through the 14 week academy. Both are receiving A ratings.
- Telecourt/Telehealth project: wires ran in Jail and Courthouse. Waiting for equipment.
- Medical Assisted Recovery (MAR) program is assisting in inmate withdrawal symptoms and hospital visits.
- Death in custody on May 12th being investigated by Illinois State Police. Autopsy and toxicology reports have been returned.
- Department of Corrections Jail inspection was completed on May 25th. No issues were noted.
- Jail inspected by Iroquois County Public Health with no issues noted. Awaiting final report.
- Painting has been done in the Jail (holding cell, doors, cellblocks)
- Deep cleaned upper cellblocks. Also, checking with ServPro on price for yearly cleaning of all cellblocks.
- Working with Cheyenne Denoyer of Champaign County Regional Planning Commission on providing counseling to inmates on life skills and job skills. There is a possibility of working with Kankakee County Jail on a program they are implementing.
- Pepsi and snack machine have been installed in the Courthouse.
- 44 arrests/intakes in May (35 male, 9 female)
- May Jail population: 20 (16 male, 2 female). 1 on ankle bracelet and 1 weekender.
- May medical: 11 doctor/hospital/emergency room visits this month, 14 mental health visits to the jail, 8 lab visits by Iroquois Memorial Hospital, 8 nurse practitioner visits (every other Thursday), 7 public health intake exams (every Thursday), 8 telephone assessment with Iroquois Memorial Hospital nurse practitioner for MAR, 1 dentist visit, 1 mental health visit at Riverside, 1 appointment in Gibson City and 1 Gibson Area Health appointment in Watseka.
- Jail overtime for May = 351 hours (105.5 hours paid, 246 hours to comp)
- Part-time hours for May = 32
- Perzee reported they have been testing their radio systems due to communication issues between the deputies and dispatchers. Perzee said there have been 40 instances since April 13th where deputies and dispatchers have not been able to get in contact with each other.

- A quote was received for the panic alarms. Perzee is researching a solution for all buildings.
- Additional part-time Correctional Officers have been hired.
- Food service bids from Aramark and Iroquois Memorial Hospital were opened last month at the Finance committee meeting. Aramark has been unable to fulfill their duties which has resulted in \$4,000 being spent from commissary to make sure the inmates receive meals. Iroquois Memorial Hospital began providing meals as of May 14th. The Finance committee will be making a final decision on the food service bids June 9th.

Coroner Bill Cheatum reported the Management committee approved the plans for the morgue on June 6th and the full board will make their decision on June 14th.

Probation Supervisor Barb King reviewed the Probation & Court Services activity report for May with the committee. The Probation department was approached by the Illinois Criminal Justice Authority and invited to apply for a rural transportation grant. The grant is approximately \$15,000-\$25,000. King continues to work on the grant.

Judge Mike Sabol reported he is working with Judge Kara Bartucci on the 2023 jury term schedule. They are anticipating 8 two week jury terms. Sabol requested West Law be added to the list of “pay now” vendors. Sabol said his Court Secretary Jackie Lehmann spends a lot of time working out billing issues with West Law and he believes paying them immediately will eliminate these issues. It was moved by Boettcher and seconded by Penny to add West Law to the pay now claims list. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Circuit Clerk Lisa Hines distributed her monthly report for May to the committee. A total of \$48,122.28 was received in fines and fees, \$5,465.56 was received from Pay Court and \$9,389.37 was received from IDROP.

Your committee met at the Administrative Center on June 9, 2022 at 9:04 A.M. Members present were Michael McTaggart, Joe Young, Charlie Alt, Paul Bowers and Steve Huse. Ernie Curtis and Sherry Johnson were absent. Also present County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Sheriff Clint Perzee, County Clerk Breein Suver, Treasurer Kurt Albers and Deputy Doug Brenner.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Paul Bowers and seconded by Joe Young to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

The department heads gave their monthly reports. They are as follows:

- County Clerk Breein Suver reported the Tax/Zoning committee made a motion to move forward with approving the updated Schedule G with Fidlar, their recording vendor. Suver explained an account is setup with Fidlar to pay the invoices from. Suver has been in contact with the County's website host about posting election results. Our website updates every 15-20 minutes but items have to be posted immediately on election night.
- Treasurer Kurt Albers reported today is the due date for the first installment of property taxes. There were some issues with the post office and people not receiving their tax bills.
- Sheriff Clint Perzee reported Jail kitchen maintenance over the past 5 years was \$6,283. This does not include utility costs. Perzee did some research and found that other jails utilize local restaurants or food service companies to cook the inmate meals in house. Consolidated Food Services could not bid due to the setup of the Jail kitchen and space. Iroquois Memorial Hospital has been providing meal service since May 17th with no issues as Aramark was unable to provide adequate services. Since last months bid opening, Iroquois Memorial Hospital has reduced their costs and will provide 2 hot meals (lunch and supper). Their new quote of

\$100,104.90 is \$5,996.70 less than the initial proposal. Aramark quoted \$73,354.05 for meals. Perzee said \$4,112.08 has been spent out of pocket for meals from January 1st through May 15th due to Aramark's inability to provide services. Finance/I.T. Chairman Michael McTaggart requested Iroquois Memorial Hospital also provide costs for 1 hot meal and 2 cold meals. Perzee asked the committee if the Jail could proceed with using Iroquois Memorial Hospital for the remainder of the budget year. It was moved by Bowers and seconded by Steve Huse to authorize the Sheriff's Department to use Iroquois Memorial Hospital for food services for the Jail for the remainder of the 2022 budget year. New pricing will be reviewed for the 2023 budget year. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried. Perzee stated the Sheriff's Department has not taken delivery of the vehicles ordered for the 2022 budget. It was suggested by the dealership to order the 2023 budget year vehicles now, while the ordering window is open. Delivery on these vehicles will not take place until 2023. Deputy Doug Brenner provided the committee with the current vehicle status and the estimated 2023 vehicle status. He also provided estimated trade-in values for the vehicles. Perzee plans to trade in 7 vehicles for an approximate amount of \$62,500 and purchase 4 new vehicles to keep on track with fleet and high mileage vehicles. Perzee added that there is no financial commitment when ordering these vehicles. It was moved by McTaggart and seconded by Young to pre-order 4 vehicles for the Sheriff's Department for the 2023 fiscal year to be finalized for purchase during the 2023 budget. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried. Perzee continued with his report regarding the radio system upgrade, phone system upgrade, panic button system improvement and body cameras. Lastly, bids for the body x-ray scanner were opened as follows:

- o Adani Systems - \$160,789.34
- o Tek84 - \$139,000.00
