PUBLIC COMMENTS

Ray Williams spoke about upcoming UCCI conference events that will be held in the next few months. The conference will focus on informing counties of common legislative issues that occur and provide information and materials that can help improve operations.

Ashley Laurent, career coach with East Central Illinois WorkNet, gave her quarterly report. She announced two students had successfully completed the program and have been hired full time at local businesses. Ms. Laurent stated that the 2024 open application period will begin in June.

Mike Tilstra CEO of Iroquois Memorial Hospital reported that IMH ambulance is up and running, with full staff 24/7. Mr. Tilstra announced the hiring of a cardiologist who will be available 3 days weekly. In closing Tilstra reported the pharmacy has increased activity by 30%.

County Health Administrator Eric Ceci noted the upcoming IPLAN meeting that will cover the 5-year plan.

Ms. Crawford announced that State Representative Jason Bunting and the Illinois House of Republican Caucus recognized Crawford as one of the Statewide Emerging Women recipients of 2024. John Martin, with Martin Development, explained that he is working on obtaining the necessary seal; however, the suppliers that he is working with do not seal building structures. He went on to explain that he works with an engineer that would be able to supply the necessary seal, but he will need time to get it. Some of the Board members felt that in order to get the project moving forward, approving the bid from Martin Development with the condition that the sealed design be provided before construction. After further discussion regarding the construction of the building and the need to meet safety requirements, it was moved by Mr. McGinnis and seconded to approve the bid from Martin Development providing he obtains the necessary seals or stamps. Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on March 4, 2024 at 9:00 A.M. Members present Lyle Behrends, Paul Bowers, Donna Crow and John Zumwalt. Mitchell Bence was absent. Also present, County Board Chairman John Shure, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake, Cameron Charles with Morton Buildings, John Martin with Martin Development and County Board members Charlie Alt, Doug Geiger and Scott Watts.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by John Zumwalt and seconded by Paul Bowers to amend and approve the agenda to open bids and take action on the Morgue project after public comments. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

(The following sections have been removed for separate consideration per action taken by the full County Board at their March 12, 2024 Recessed Session meeting.)

Bids for the Morgue project were opened as follows:

- *Martin Development - \$64,500*
- *Hoke Construction - \$47,127*
- *Morton Buildings - \$137,114*

The committee reviewed and discussed the bids with the contractors in attendance. Cameron Charles with Morton Buildings said their bid includes site work, exterior and overhead doors, insulation as well as the other items requested in the bid packet. They are available to begin work April 1st, if needed. John Martin with Martin Development said his bid also includes site work, exterior and overhead doors, insulation and the additional items requested in the bid packet. Martin Development's schedule is readily available to begin the project. Upon review of Hoke Construction's bid, it was noted that their bid is for the building frame/shell only. It was moved by Bowers and seconded by Zumwalt to accept Martin Development's bid in the amount of \$64,500 for the Morgue project. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake's report included the following:

- The heat pump outside the Regional Planning Office is being replaced on March 19th.
- Drake reported there were small boiler issues in the Administrative Center.
- Fire extinguishers will be re-certified and tagged this month. This is done annually.
- During the walk through with IPMG's risk management contractor, it was recommended to have an AED in the public areas. Drake is working with Sheriff Clint Perzee and ICPHD Administrator Eric Ceci to get this handled.
- Drake contacted Hall's Lawn & Garden and informed them of their mowing bid being accepted.

Zumwalt reported he was contacted about future potential well sites from the City of Watseka. The email from Robinson Engineering stated there are three existing City wells located in the northeast part of town and the City would like an additional well in the south or western part of town and they would like authorization from the County allowing them to construct a test well on the County property south of the Courthouse. The matter was tabled and Zumwalt will gather further information from Robinson Engineering.

Bids for fencing and concrete at the Animal Control Building will be opened in April.

County Board Chairman John Shure suggested the committee hold off on approving a bid until they can be discussed with the City of Watseka. The committee tabled action on the Grant Street Drainage Project bids.

The committee discussed putting the County Farm lease out for bid. Bids will be posted in July and opened in August. Soil testing bids will also be posted in July and opened in August.

Behrends reported there were no updates on the FSA lease that expires in September. He will reach out to them again.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Zumwalt and seconded by Bowers to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

During old business, Crow inquired on the pending approval from the City of Watseka for the Morgue in regards to the floodplain. County Board member Doug Geiger stated the site plan hasn't been accepted by the City of Watseka and can possibly have an update by the board meeting next Tuesday.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Bowers and seconded by Crow to adjourn at 10:26 A.M. Motion carried.

Your Committee to whom was referred **Policy & Procedure** would beg leave to submit the following report on the matters before them:

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on February 29, 2024 at 9:00 A.M. Members present were County Board Chairman John Shure, Paul Ducat, Lyle Behrends, Charlie Alt and Jed Whitlow. Michael McTaggart was absent. Also present, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, County Clerk Breein Suver, EMA Director Scott Anderson and County Board members Doug Geiger, Scott Watts and John Zumwalt.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Paul Ducat and seconded by Jed Whitlow to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

EMA Director Scott Anderson distributed his monthly report to the committee.

- There were no incidents to report.
- The first invoice from American Environmental was received and included in this month's expenses. The second plan meeting is scheduled for April 25th at the MABAS training facility in Crescent City.
- Anderson completed the first quarterly report on the 2024 EMP grant and the information has been forwarded to the state for reimbursement.
- Anderson received certificates in the follows:
 - ICS 300 – Intermediate Incident Command System
 - Certified Storm Spotter – National Weather Service
- The Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) held their meeting February 21st. There was not a quorum present for the meeting. Copies of bylaws were distributed and briefly discussed. Anderson attended the Iroquois County Amateur Radio Club meeting on February 22nd.
- The National Weather Service's severe weather spotting class was held on February 15th. The class had more than 50 attendees. The National Weather Service has awarded Iroquois County the Storm Ready County designation

effective February 2nd. A formal presentation will take place March 4th at 11:30 A.M. outside of the main entrance to the Iroquois County Courthouse, weather permitting.

- EMA volunteers attended the storm spotting class and have satisfied the requirement set forth to remain as a member of the group.
- Anderson provided an update on the out of service rescue vehicle being gifted to EMA. He has received specifications of the engine that needs replaced and is working on gathering cost information. Once the amounts are finalized, Anderson will begin seeking funding sources.
- Anderson continues to post informational updates on EMA's Facebook page.

Ducat requested Anderson reach out to local fire chiefs regarding plans for upcoming battery storage.

The Committee Chairs gave their monthly reports:

- Management Chairman Lyle Behrends reported the committee will open bids for the morgue project.
- Tax/Planning & Zoning Chairman Paul Ducat reported the committee will receive their monthly reports from department heads and discuss battery storage. The Health committee will receive their monthly reports from Animal Control and the health department.
- Judicial Chairman Jed Whitlow reported the committee will receive their monthly reports.
- Highway Chairman Charlie Alt reported the committee will receive their monthly reports and take action on a resolution for a bridge in Pigeon Grove Township.

During chairman comments, Shure informed the committee of the Governor's plan to eliminate the 1% grocery sales tax. Shure said he received communication from UCCI asking how much the County's revenue will be reduced because of this. Finance Manager Jill Johnson said she spoke with Treasurer Kurt Albers and asked him to look into the matter. Shure also spoke to the committee about night meetings being advocated for the County Board. Shure reminded the committee that night meetings were held approximately six years ago and the number of people interested in becoming a County Board member did not increase. Also, the attendance for the County Board meetings did not increase during the time night meetings were held.

There were no updates on the paid leave for all workers act. Last month it was agreed to finalize the policy after the final ruling which is estimated to be in March. Shure noted there is a bill going through legislation that exempts all County employees. Behrends recommended any questions regarding the policy should be forwarded to Shure and then discussed with State's Attorney Jim Devine.

The committee continued their review of the County Code Book. Revisions are as follows:

- Sec. 10-48 Definitions – committee would like to review the definitions of Political Subdivision and Principal Executive Officer with State's Attorney Jim Devine.

Appointments will be made at the County Board meeting.

Correspondence was distributed to the committee. A notice was received from the City of Watseka requesting photos be taken and submitted of the pipes that bring water into the

building. The notice will be discussed at the Management committee meeting and Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake will be notified of the request. Lastly, Shure discussed the health department's IPLAN which is updated every five years. The health department is inviting all board members to participate in the process.

The committee reviewed the claims. The American Environmental claim is payment one of four. These payments will be reimbursed by a grant. It was moved by Ducat and seconded by Behrends to pay the claims, except American Environmental in the amount of \$13,005.59 which will be paid at the appropriate time, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There was no old business.

During new business, County Board member John Zumwalt addressed the committee about the Grant Street drainage project bid opening at the Management committee on Monday, March 4th. Bids are due Friday, March 1st. At this time, it is uncertain what portion the City of Watseka will be responsible for paying.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Ducat and seconded by Behrends to adjourn at 10:24 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your committee met at the Administrative Center on March 5, 2024 at 9:00 A.M. Members present were Paul Ducat, Doug Geiger, Steve Huse and Jed Whitlow. Also present, Finance Manager Jill Johnson and ICPHD Administrator Eric Ceci.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Jed Whitlow and seconded by Doug Geiger to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Geiger and seconded by Whitlow to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There were no public comments.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson reported the registration deposit for February was \$4,955. There are 11 cases currently open with 8 dogs and 1 cat waiting for placement. The Animal Control Officers closed 23 cases in February. The closed cases consisted of 7 dogs running loose, 4 bite reports, 2 injured dogs, 3 abandoned dogs, 2 well checks, 2 aggressive dogs, 2 nuisance calls and 1 livestock claim. Fence bids for the Animal Control Building will be opened in April.

ICPHD Administrator Eric Ceci informed the committee the first IPLAN meeting will be held March 13th in the County Board room. The County's IPLAN is reviewed every five years and uses statistics and data to determine where we are in terms of health for the residents of Iroquois County and where we think we need to focus for the next five years. The health department is bringing back the safe sitter program on March 27th. This program teaches youth in sixth through eighth grade about how to stay safe while babysitting. Upon completion of the program, participants will receive a certificate.

Ceci distributed the monthly summary report of programs. Environmental Health reported 12 temporary food permits, 4 boil orders, 4 food complaints, 2 nuisance complaints and 1 sewage complaint. Community Health reported 2 animal bites, 1 COVID-19 outbreak in a long-term care facility, 2 confirmed cases of histoplasmosis and a Streptococcal A investigation. In addition, there were 3 new Tuberculosis investigations. Community Outreach held 4 hygiene presentations at local schools, 2 CPR trainings and 2 Narcan trainings were held. The vision/hearing screenings will end soon for the school year. Senior Services has a total of 187 clients with 29 annual/need bases reassessments and 7 new client assessments.

Ceci reported the health department is currently seeking an Associate Sanitarian and a part-time nurse. The job postings are on the County's website.

There was no old business.

During new business, the committee reviewed ABRA's quarterly report.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Whitlow and seconded by Huse to adjourn at 9:19 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on March 5, 2024 at 9:32 A.M. Members present were Paul Ducat, Doug Geiger, Steve Huse and Jed Whitlow. Also present, County Board Chairman John Shure, County Clerk Breein Suver, Treasurer Kurt Albers, Supervisor of Assessments Mia McCammon, Planning & Zoning Administrator Julie Feller and ICPHD Administrator Eric Ceci.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Jed Whitlow and seconded by Doug Geiger to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Steve Huse and seconded by Whitlow to pay the claims subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There were no public comments.

The department heads gave their monthly reports:

- County Clerk Breein Suver reported 35% of the vote by mail ballots have been returned and there have been 128 early voters. Election judge school was held last week. Suver is working with Sheriff Clint Perzee on getting ballots to inmates currently in the Jail. The County Clerk's Office mailed 1,011 statements of economic interest last week. Recording began using MyDec

which allows for e-recording documents and land transactions. The remaining ballot boxes will be going out next week. Lastly, Suver was invited by the Clerk & Recorders Association to help rewrite the recording statute.

- Treasurer Kurt Albers reported the Treasurer's Office is working on items for the audit. Mobile home tax bills should be mailed out in two weeks. Albers is working with a new credit card vendor.
- Supervisor of Assessments Mia McCammon reported Devnet will be here April 3rd to begin the CAMA training implementation for the Assessment Office. Training will last for 8 weeks each Wednesday. Township Assessors that choose to get on board will be trained separately. Board of Review hearings will be held the last week of March. McCammon gave an update on the 2020 PTAB case for Gilman Healthcare stating she stipulated with them for the price they originally requested. They have requested stipulating for 2021 and 2022, also. McCammon presented an Intergovernmental Agreement for Lovejoy/Milford/Prairie Green/Stockland Multi-Township. McCammon said she did deviate from the original per parcel charge due to state statute that says the fee must be within the realm of what the current Assessor was being paid. This will be a monthly fee through the end of the year until the interested individual receives their CIAO license. The committee recommended McCammon change the agreement from payment being made to the General Fund to payment being made to the GIS Fund. It was moved by Geiger and seconded by Whitlow to move accept the Intergovernmental Agreement for Milford Multi-Township with payment being made into the GIS Fund. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried. Lastly, McCammon requested action be taken on GIS data release to third parties. Bruce Harris currently charges a \$500 fee but in the past the Assessment Office has never assessed an additional fee to the third party. Collecting this fee will help build revenue for future GIS projects. McCammon noted that additional verbiage should be added to the data request form that states the information cannot be sold and is for their intended purpose only. Suver noted an ordinance may need to be in place to collect these fees. It was moved by Geiger and seconded by Huse to move forward with implementing a fee for GIS data requests with the understanding that the data cannot be sold. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Your committee met at the Administrative Center on March 7, 2024 at 9:03 A.M. Members present were Michael McTaggart, Lyle Behrends, Charlie Alt, Paul Bowers, Doug Geiger and Scott Watts. Also present, County Board Chairman John Shure, Sheriff Clint Perzee, County Clerk Breein Suver, Treasurer Kurt Albers, ETS Director Eric Raymond, ICPHD Administrator Eric Ceci and Suzie Werner with HomeStar Insurance.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Doug Geiger and seconded by Lyle Behrends to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Suzie Werner with HomeStar Insurance reported she is waiting on an updated report from Blue Cross Blue Shield and will share the report with the Finance Office once it is received.

The department heads gave their monthly reports. They are as follows:

- County Clerk Breein Suver reported statements of economic interest have been mailed. Pollution and railroad assessments were received and have been entered. Suver said Supervisor of Assessments Mia McCammon reported at the Tax/Planning & Zoning committee that the board of review will be meeting the last week of March. Once they have finished, they will finalize the abstracts. There is typically a 4-6-week turnaround on the multiplier once the abstracts have been received.
- Treasurer Kurt Albers reported mobile home bills should be going out within the next couple of weeks and will be due in May. Albers is getting bids for the cost of printing and mailing property tax bills. The Governor is proposing eliminating the 1% grocery tax. However, if local governments feel they are losing too much tax money then we should implement the tax ourselves.
- Sheriff Clint Perzee reported the alarm system for the Administrative Center is scheduled for installation on March 12th. Deputy Brandon Legan is retiring Friday, March 9th after almost 20 years of service in corrections and as a deputy. Correctional Officer Matt Pulley is also leaving the department on Friday, March 9th. Valerie Wehrle has been hired on part-time to fill the position. The Corrections schedule is being adjusted to reduce overtime during training/open shifts. Correctional Officer Linkin Longfellow will be going to the Corrections Academy in April. On March 8th patrol shifts will also be adjusted to provide better coverage during dayshift patrol. Each dayshift will have 3 deputies and each night shift will have 4 deputies with Lt. Ryan Morefield being scheduled Monday through Friday to assist with administrative duties and patrol. We are in the process of building out the radio channels with Starcom and awaiting the arrival of equipment in June. Updated ballistic vests should be received in mid-March. Perzee continues to work on various grants for body cams which are mandated by January 1, 2025.
- ETS Director Eric Raymond reported the ETSB board opened bids for the radio consoles. Action was not taken at this time and the bids will be reviewed

further. Raymond noted the backup internet with Conxxus is not active yet and would like an update from AreaWide.

- ICPHD Administrator Eric Ceci reported the County Board members have all been given invitations for the IPLAN meeting on March 13th in the board room. The IPLAN is revisited every five years and goes over where the County is as far as health status and what should be prioritized. The health department is also restarting the Safe Sitter program for grades 6-8. The cost of the program is \$35 and participants will receive a certificate of completion. The program teaches the participants how to be a safe babysitter. Lastly, Ceci requested Amazon be added to the pay now claims list. The board of health will also need to give their approval at their next meeting on March 11th. The health department has been utilizing Amazon for purchases for the ESS grant. The ESS grant was designed to help senior citizens in their home that have emergency needs to be fulfilled. It was moved by Behrends and seconded by Geiger to approve adding Amazon to the pay now claims listing. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.
- County Board Chairman John Shure discussed the possibility of the grocery tax being eliminated. It has been estimated that the loss of revenue would be \$700,000 per year.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Michael McTaggart and seconded by Behrends to pay the claims subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

During old business, Scott Watts discussed the email sent from Finance Manager Jill Johnson addressing payroll checks and timesheets. Corrected checks can be written within a reasonable timeframe but often times the dollar amounts are very small.
