PUBLIC COMMENTS

Kira Ebert, Chief of Staff for State Representative Jason Bunting, reported that Peace Meals are back and available in Iroquois County at the following establishments: Cindy’s Roadside Café in Buckley, Cissna Park Restaurant in Cissna Park, The Watseka Table in Watseka, and Bert’s Place in Milford. She also gave details about a Summer Reading Program sponsored by Representative Bunting open to children from Kindergarten to 5th grade.

Michael Thompson, Chebanse Township Road Commissioner and Adam Weber, Ashkum Township Road Commissioner spoke to the Board about the bid that was received from IPC for a bridge in their area. They have been in the process of getting the bridge replaced for the past 11 years. They encouraged the Board to accept the bid for the project now, while there is federal funding secured for a large part of the project. It is anticipated that the amount will only keep increasing and it was also noted the funding will not always be available.

Mrs. Crow welcomed Monte Andrews, the new PCOM for the Tri-County Rural Transportation District consisting of Iroquois, Ford, and Livingston counties. She also introduced Angela Frary, the new Animal Control Administrator.

Your Committee to whom was referred **Management Services** would beg leave to submit the following report on the matters before them:

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on June 2, 2025 at 9:06 A.M. Members present were Kathleen Perkinson, Jamie Bakken, Donna Crow, Roger Bard, Scott Watts and John Grant. Also present, County Board Chairman Paul Ducat, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake, ETS Director Eric Raymond and County Board member Charlie Alt.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Scott Watts and seconded by Donna Crow to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

During public comments, ETS Director Eric Raymond addressed the committee regarding an issue with the 911 communications tower stating EMA Director Scott Anderson installed his weather station on the communications tower without any discussion or permission being granted. Raymond said he has requested Anderson remove the weather station from the tower as there is the potential to disrupt emergency communications. The weather station device is currently running horizontally in front of one of the new Starcom antennas. Raymond added there are many other places in and along the outside of the building where the device can be mounted. Raymond said Anderson recommended he contact Motorola to confirm if there will be any challenges or disruptions. Raymond has not been in contact with Motorola yet. Finance Manager Jill Johnson said she spoke with County Board Chairman Paul Ducat regarding the matter and Anderson has intentions to relocate the weather station. Lastly, Raymond reported the go-live date for Starcom was May 27th and there has only been one known challenge with reception.

Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake's report included the following:

- Heat pump in the USDA breakroom needed charged.
- Carpets were cleaned and tile floors were stripped and waxed in the USDA Office over the holiday weekend.
- Depending on the budget, Drake would like to have the hallway floors in the Administrative Building stripped and waxed as well.

- Parking lots at the Administrative Building are scheduled to be seal-coated and striped this summer. Drake will inform staff in advance so they can make alternate parking arrangements.
- The Jail experienced some drain issues that Drake was able to take care of.
- Maintenance trucks were serviced.
- Flowers were planted at the Courthouse.
- Outback Pumping is a new vendor that will be used at the Jail replacing Hiltz.

Watts provided an update on the County Farm stating the crop is up on all fields, grass is coming up where the waterway was seeded and the mowing has been done. Watts said he would like fertilizer to go out for bid in August.

The committee discussed long-term maintenance Capital Improvement projects for the next budget year. Drake stated all building roofs are in good condition. The steps at the Courthouse need repaired. Johnson added that the parking lots are on an every three year rotation and \$20,000 is budgeted each year for heat pumps. In addition, the Truist loan (BB&T – SmartWatt project) is paid from the capital expense line. Beginning in 2026, additional payments can be made to this loan. Johnson is including an additional payment of \$43,410 as requested by the County Board when the loan first originated and will also budget an additional \$10,000 each year. Sheriff Clint Perzee is getting estimates for repairs to the Jail basement floor. Items to consider for the Animal Control Building include additional kennel runs. Johnson would also like to revisit installing guillotine doors in the kennel runs as previously requested. Drake added that the HVAC system is in good working order and the roof is also in good condition. The interior of the building has damage from the animals. Crow stated there is believed to be a market for grooming services and the building has the potential to add this service. Further discussion will be held at the Health committee meeting.

Management chairman Kathleen Perkinson provided an update on the boardroom configuration stating the room was rearranged this morning. The next step is to work with AreaWide on the AV system. The committee provided their feedback on the arrangement of the boardroom.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by John Grant and seconded by Jamie Bakken to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Crow and seconded by Bakken to adjourn at 9:43 A.M. Motion carried.

Your Committee to whom was referred **Finance/I.T.** would beg leave to submit the following report on the matters before them:

Your committee met at the Administrative Center on June 2, 2025 at 10:00 A.M. Members present were Scott Watts, Kathleen Perkinson, Doug Geiger, Charlie Alt, Jamie Bakken and Donna Crow. Also present, County Board Chairman Paul Ducat, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, County Clerk Breein Suver, Sheriff Clint Perzee, Treasurer Kurt Albers, ETS Director Eric Raymond, Supervisor of Assessments Mia McCammon, County Engineer Alan Harwood, Superintendent of Veterans Assistance Jennifer Ingram, Chief Deputy Kallie Riddle, Suzie Werner with HomeStar Insurance and Jeff Facer and Adam Sadorus with AreaWide Technologies.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Doug Geiger and seconded by Donna Crow to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Suzie Werner with HomeStar Insurance reported the medical loss ratio is currently at 105.4%, which is a decrease from last month's 140%. The closer this number gets to 80%, the better our renewal will be in December.

Jeff Facer with AreaWide Technologies revisited the new EDR (End-Point Detection and Response) tool that was discussed last month. The software was approved last month but was not communicated to AreaWide. Facer also discussed the age of the servers. Facer said we are currently running a 2012 R2 which has not been supported by Microsoft for several years. This poses a major weakness in our security and needs to be upgraded. Lastly, Facer discussed the KnowBe4 education tool which sends out fake emails. The employee must make an educated decision on whether or not to open the email. Training is provided in the event the email is opened. Finance Manager Jill Johnson stated that KnowBe4 is renewed every year and is currently set up for emails to be sent monthly. We also have the capability of designing the emails that are sent. ETS Director Eric Raymond let Facer know that the link sent in the educational emails is protected by Mimecast.

The department heads gave their monthly reports. They are as follows:

- Finance Manager Jill Johnson reported the FY2023 audit has been closed, and she is working on the FY2024 audit. A meeting with the auditors is being held next Monday to review fund balances. Budget worksheets and budget hearing schedules were sent to department heads. Johnson said she also sent revenue and grant fund information. Budget hearings are scheduled for June 23rd in the County Board room and June 24th in the employee breakroom.
- Sheriff Clint Perzee reported the go live date for Starcom was May 20th for the radio system. There were some issues at dispatch, but they are being worked through. The annual DOC Jail inspection report was received with no deficiencies and commendations on the Jail, staff and progress made. Verizon phones have been distributed to the patrol deputies. Daniel Brutlag was hired for the open Corrections position. Currently, the Sheriff's Department is fully staffed. Applications are being accepted through June 19th for Deputy Sheriff's to form a hiring list. The physical agility portion of the process will be held January 21st and the written exam will be held the following Saturday. Shon Johnson will officially retire from his Correctional Officer position on June 5th marking 27 years of service for Iroquois County. Lastly, Perzee said he was approached by a County Board member inquiring about the flooring project at the Courthouse and Jail. Perzee said the tiles, which are asbestos tiles, are starting to come loose in some areas of the floor and will need to be addressed. Perzee asked Johnson to add the project to the capital improvement list. Perzee also spoke with a certified asbestos abator, and they offered to provide us with a cost estimate. Once removed, a decision will need to be made on the type of flooring that will replace the tiles.
- Treasurer Kurt Albers reported Devnet printed and mailed the property tax bills on May 19th. Collection of payments has begun with due dates of July 7th and September 8th.
- County Clerk Breein Suver reported she is working on the FY2026 budget for her department. An IVRS grant is received each year from the State Board of Elections, but Suver said she will not know the amount received in time for budget hearings. The reimbursement for election judges from the consolidated

election was received in the amount of \$9,295 which amounts to \$65 per election judge. We also received reimbursement for the death certificate surcharge grant for FY2024 in the amount of \$1,297. The surcharge is received from a portion \$2 that is collected from each certified copy of a death certificate we issue. This money can be used for equipment or services for the production of death certificates.

- Supervisor of Assessments Mia McCammon reported she is working on the FY2026 budget for her department. State's Attorney Mike Quinlan approved a resolution, and action will be taken at the Tax/Planning & Zoning committee meeting tomorrow. The resolution is to authorize the County to charge a fee to the townships and multi-townships that are not completing their assessment work.
- ETS Director Eric Raymond reported a resignation in the 911 Center. The vacancy has been posted, and interviews will begin soon. There were some challenges with Starcom but they are being remedied. Currently there are 8 dispatchers in the 911 Center. Full staff is considered to be 9 dispatchers, but Raymond is requesting approval to hire a 10th dispatcher. Charlie Alt added that he has been overseeing the 911 Center for many years now and recognizes that Raymond is very busy. He believes that a 10th dispatcher is needed.

County Engineer Alan Harwood provided the committee with salary information provided by the Illinois Department of Transportation. Harwood was hired at a salary of \$136,000 for the period of July 15, 2024 through December 31, 2024. Harwood's salary increased to \$140,000 for the period of January 1, 2025 through December 31, 2025. IDOT determines what they deem to be the minimum recommended salary. Harwood is paid with Motor Fuel Tax (MFT) funds. If his salary is at least 95% of the required minimum rate, then MFT is reimbursed 50% by federal funds. For FY2025, the recommended minimum salary is \$138,700 with Harwood's salary being set at \$140,000. Harwood said the trend is for the recommended salary to increase by 2%. Harwood will be requesting a 2% salary increase during budget hearings.

Discussion was held on the loan request from Veterans Assistance. Superintendent of Veterans Assistance Jennifer Ingram stated she was notified approximately two weeks ago by the Treasurer's Office that the Veterans Assistance account was overdrawn. County Board Chairman Paul Ducat approved a loan of \$15,000 and Ingram is requesting an additional \$30,000 to be paid back over the next three years. The previous loan given to Veterans Assistance has been paid in full. Ingram said she believes the issue lies with her cash flow and when the tax distributions are made. There have been a few unexpected expenses such as an increased phone bill and cremation fees for indigent veterans. Johnson suggested adding an additional miscellaneous line item rather than budgeting to the penny and also believes there should be more communication between Veterans Assistance and the Treasurer's Office about fund balances. Johnson also suggested monthly payments be made rather than a lump sum. County Board Chairman Paul Ducat inquired about the members that serve on the Veterans Assistance Board. Ingram will provide the committee with a list of board members and stated that Charlie Alt is a liaison. The Veterans Assistance board is aware of the discrepancy. Lastly, Ducat inquired on the hiring of additional staff. A full-time employee was hired at \$34,560 per year and this addition was budgeted. It was moved by Crow and seconded by Jamie Bakken

to advance \$45,000 from the General Fund to Veterans Assistance to be paid over the next three fiscal years. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

The committee continued discussion of hiring an additional telecommunicator in the 911 Center. ETS Director Eric Raymond stated he is looking to hire a 10th dispatcher to reduce the amount of overtime. Bakken asked Raymond to explain the shift schedules and how hiring an additional employee will reduce overtime. Raymond explained that the dispatchers work a 6-day week with 4 days on and 2 days off. There are 2 dispatchers working per shift. The starting salary for a dispatcher is \$20.20 per hour with an average new hire cost of approximately \$51,000. Raymond also said the ETS Board supports the hiring of an additional employee. The current overtime budget is \$90,000 and Raymond would like to reduce this to \$70,000. Currently, part-time staff are not permitted per the FOP contract. Johnson inquired about the assistant that was budgeted. Raymond said the position was budgeted but the position was not filled. He will be including the position again for the upcoming budget year. Finance Chairman Scott Watts asked the committee for a motion on hiring an additional telecommunicator. No motion was made.

The Finance Committee reports received by the department heads were discussed. Watts will speak with the Treasurer's Office about submitting their reports to the committee in addition to the County Board. The vendor list provided by Johnson will be distributed quarterly.

There were no Finance chairman comments.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Bakken and seconded by Crow to pay the claims subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Bakken and seconded by Crow to adjourn at 11:27 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your committee met at the Administrative Center on June 3, 2025 at 9:00 A.M. Members present were Donna Crow, Jody Munsterman, Steve Huse, Chad McGinnis, Roger Bard and John Grant. Also present, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, Animal Control Administrator Angela Frary and ICPHD Administrator Robin Allen.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Steve Huse and seconded by Jody Munsterman to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

Finance Manager Jill Johnson introduced Animal Control Administrator Angela Frary to the committee. Johnson will continue to work alongside Frary until the end of the fiscal year. Frary reported the registration deposit for May was \$4,464. The Animal Control Officers closed 31 cases in May. The closed cases consisted of 1 bat, 5 bite reports, 3 well checks, 14 dogs running loose, 2 injured dogs, 4 aggressive dogs, 1 dog on dog attack, 1 lost dog, 1 found dog and 3 relinquishment inquires. There was also 1 animal sent to wild animal control and 1 animal sent to the Department of Natural Resources. There are 7 animals going to I-Care, 2 animals have been re-homed and 1 animal is being fostered. Next Tuesday following the board meeting, Health chairman Donna Crow will be meeting with Johnson and Frary to discuss the Animal Control FY2026 budget.

ICPHD Administrator Robin Allen distributed the monthly summary report of programs. Environmental Health issued 15 temporary food permits, and 7 radon kits were given. There were 6 private sewage inspections. There were 6 mosquitos collected for west nile surveillance. Allen stated the health department is not collecting birds this year for west nile surveillance due to bird flu. Community Health reported 46 childhood immunizations. School physicals and immunizations were done in May and an additional clinic is scheduled for August. There were 19 adult immunizations. Community Health also reported 1 death due to Legionellosis. The Tuberculosis program investigated 1 new case and performed 1 skin test. Community Outreach conducted 14 educational presentations. These events included Narcan training and CPR training. Community Outreach will be holding safe sitter classes in June and July and CPR classes in June. Vision and hearing screenings are complete for the school year. Allen reported a change in staff in the Senior Services department. Danielle Walls has resigned from her position in the Senior Services department and will be transferring to the receptionist position. Amy Anthony has been hired to fill the Senior Services position. Lastly, the Board of Health Finance meeting is scheduled for June 4th at 4:30 P.M. Crow inquired on the open

Board of Health position. Allen said the pediatrician that was interviewed last month has not made their decision yet.

Crow reminded the committee that budget hearings are scheduled for June 23rd and June 24th. Crow said she has reached out to a veterinarian regarding Animal Control and has not received a response. Frary added that she spoke to a veterinarian in Bradley who was also contacted by a County Board member and believes they may have some interest.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by John Grant and seconded by Huse to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There was no old business.

There was no new business.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Roger Bard and seconded by Huse to adjourn at 9:15 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on June 3, 2025 at 10:00 A.M. Members present were Doug Geiger, Kathleen Perkinson, Steve Huse, Roger Bard, Chad McGinnis and Jed Whitlow. Also present, County Clerk Breein Suver, Treasurer Kurt Albers, Supervisor of Assessments Mia McCammon, Planning & Zoning Administrator Julie Feller, Ashton Merbach and Toby Valentino with Ranger Power, Gillian Kelanan with Scout Clean Energy, Davis Griscom with Allium Renewable Energy, Andrew Keyt with Heyl Royster, Scott Drabicki with Clark Dietz and County Board member Donna Crow.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Steve Huse and seconded by Jed Whitlow to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Kathleen Perkinson and seconded by Whitlow to pay the claims subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

The department heads gave their monthly reports:

- Supervisor of Assessments Mia McCammon informed the committee that many calls and emails are coming to the Assessment Office regarding property tax bills. McCammon said she and her staff are doing their best to answer these questions and thoroughly educate the public about the property tax process. If board members are also receiving inquiries from the public, McCammon asked that they direct people to the Assessment Office for assistance. GIS is working well and McCammon said she has received a lot of compliments on the new GIS site.
- Planning & Zoning Administrator Julie Feller reported there are 3 renewable energy projects scheduled to go before the Zoning Board of Appeals on June 17th. There are currently more than 20 potential projects in Iroquois County and Feller provided the committee with a listing of these projects. Feller will begin renewals for campgrounds and kennels. There were 7 building permits issued in May with a total of 46 permits issued for the year. There were 12 background checks performed, and 6 solicitor licenses were issued. The ACH account is in place and the Treasurer's Office is communicating with Feller on

when money is deposited. Feller was contacted by the owner of the Loda property and stated they are working on cleaning up the property. The remaining problem properties can't be acted on until the change is made to the County Code. The zoning layer on GIS is a work in progress.

- County Clerk Breein Suver reported her office is preparing for the biennial purge of voter registration. New voter cards will be mailed to all registered voters. The County Clerk's Office is also preparing for the March '26 Primary Election. Circulation for petitions for the primary election will begin the last week of July into the first week of August. Filing will begin the last week of October into the first week of November.
- Treasurer Kurt Albers informed the committee that the news media had reported incorrect information about mobile home tax bills. The due date was May 30th and liens will not be filed until later in the year. Property tax bills were mailed on May 19th, and payments are currently being collected. The first installment is due July 7th, and the second installment is due September 8th.

McCammon presented a resolution to the committee for their approval. The resolution will allow Iroquois County to be reimbursed per parcel from the townships for not having a township assessor. McCammon added that State's Attorney Mike Quinlan has reviewed and approved the resolution. If the resolution is approved, McCammon will send the resolution to all townships. McCammon said there is a bill in the general assembly to increase the census from 1,000 to 3,000 which means townships would have to have 3,000 to remain a single township. It was moved by Perkinson and seconded by Huse to accept the resolution presented by Supervisor of Assessments Mia McCammon. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

The committee began discussion on the review of the Louis Creek Solar application. Andrew Keyt with Heyl Royster reported the application was received on May 23rd and the \$250,000 application fee was paid. The project includes a Battery Energy Storage System (BESS) to be regulated as a supporting facility under the CSEF ordinance. Upon review of the application, there were a few areas that need additional information. Those items are as follows:

- Complete participating property owner information
- Natural Resource inventory from the Soil and Water Conservation District
- Evidence of notice to the public road authorities
- An approved AIMA
- Submission of a variance request for the living buffer requirement

The items were communicated to David Griscom with Allium Renewable Energy. Tax/Planning & Zoning chairman Doug Geiger asked that the sequence of steps to follow be explained to the committee since this is the first application brought to the committee. Keyt said the committee will receive information from himself and Scott Drabicki with Clark Dietz about whether the application is complete and ready to go to hearing. The committee will take action and move the application onto the next phase which is the Zoning Board of Appeals hearing. The Zoning Board of Appeals sets findings of fact, makes a recommendation to the committee and recommends any conditions of approval. The committee will then make their recommendation to the full County Board. The final step is the County Board's decision. Under statute, the application must go before the County Board within 30 days of leaving the Zoning Board of Appeals. Perkinson commented that based on the level of activity the committee has seen, and the participation received from the companies who are looking to

submit applications, it is incumbent on us to be as timely as possible but also make informed decisions. Perkinson recommended the committee consider having a standing committee meeting weekly. Meetings will be held based on whether we have information to review to allow the committee to respond to the applications in a timely manner and keep the process moving. Information can be emailed in advance to give the committee time to review. Scott Drabicki with Clark Dietz also addressed the application received and noted that there is a variance for fencing. The applicant is proposing an 8' tall chainlink perimeter fence but the County's BESF ordinance requires a 10' perimeter fence. The plan should be revised to reflect a 10' fence around the BESS. Perkinson inquired on the Agricultural Impact Mitigation Agreement (AIMA). David Griscom with Allium Renewable Energy explained that the AIMA was submitted to the state and he made them aware of the impending deadline of possibly having a public hearing in mid to late June. The agreement has been mitigated on their end, and they are waiting for the state to send it back. Keyt added that it used to be a requirement to have a fully executed AIMA before the application is sent to hearing. State statute has changed, and the only requirement is that the AIMA be fully executed at the time of the hearing. Geiger discussed the items pertaining to the Soil and Water Conservation District and the public road authorities. Keyt said per statute, the applicant must send their Natural Resource Inventory application to the Soil and Water Conservation District and the Soil and Water Conservation District has 30 days to send it back. This is not a condition precedent to the application being complete. The condition is the applicant sending their application to the Soil and Water Conservation District. Griscom informed the committee that he emailed the application last night to the Artesia Road Coordinator and the County Engineer. Geiger and Feller were copied on the email. Griscom said there was some confusion regarding the Solar and Water Conservation District as it was a little unclear in the ordinance, but he will send the documents today. Griscom added that it was noted in their application that they didn't want to include contact information for the participating landowners for confidentiality reasons and can submit the list to the Zoning office separately. To recap, Geiger stated the committee has been sent an application, our external advisors have completed their review and presented the deficiencies listed. The applicant is present and has complied with some of the deficiencies. The committee can choose to move forward with the application today with the promise from the applicant that the other items will be completed or the committee can hold a special meeting once all items are complied with. Perkinson recommended holding a special meeting on Tuesday, June 10th at 8:30 A.M. Griscom told the committee he can complete the remaining items via email within a few minutes today during the committee meeting. Action on the Louis Creek Solar application was tabled until confirmation is received that all deficiencies have been complied with.

Keyt provided an update on the applications for the three community solar projects. Trajectory has two solar projects, and Green Key has one solar project all under 5 megawatts. Keyt said these projects are typically under 30 acres and each project is well under this acreage. The projects were applied for prior to the County's ordinances going into effect. Therefore, the process the committee just went through with Allium doesn't apply. A public hearing has been scheduled for June 17th. The Zoning Board of Appeals will hold their hearing and send their recommendations to the committee. The committee will then send their recommendations to the full County Board. Keyt added that all three applications mostly follow the ordinances that are in place. When it comes to the building permit, they will have to follow the building permit requirements. Geiger stated that Feller will send all applications to the committee for

review. No action is required today. Geiger asked for clarification if the Zoning Board of Appeals denies an application. Keyt said the same process will be followed. The Zoning Board of Appeals will send their recommendation to the committee and the committee will send the recommendation to the County Board for a final decision.

Feller presented amendments to Section 14 of the County Code. Feller has worked along with County Board Chairman Paul Ducat and State's Attorney Mike Quinlan on the proposed changes that include the daily fine to not exceed \$1,000 and added a section allowing attorney fees to be reimbursed. Feller stated that when there is an issue with a property, she will send a letter to the property owner. If no effort is made by the property owner to comply, fines will begin and each day a violation exists or continues shall constitute a separate offense. If a property owner is unable to pay the fines, Feller said she believes the property can be assumed by the County and sold. It was moved by Whitlow and seconded by Huse to adopt the resolution amending Section 14 of the County Code. A roll call vote was taken. Perkinson, aye; Huse, aye; Bard, absent; McGinnis, nay; Whitlow, aye; Geiger, aye. Motion carried.

Feller also presented the Meteorological Tower Application for review. Geiger expressed concern on the application stating it is very similar to our Cell Tower Application and the 199 feet requirement doesn't seem appropriate. Keyt said the reasoning behind the 199 feet requirement is that when it goes over 200 feet, they are subject to FAA approval. The committee will review the application. No action is needed at this time. Perkinson asked Feller to change the sketch of the site plan included with the application.

An update was given on the floodplain ordinance violation. Drabicki informed the committee that Ameren has been very responsive to the notification of violation and also responsive to working with us to remedy the situation. Drabicki said he recently met with their staff engineers and was provided with a concept plan that would provide a net zero impact to the flood plain at that specific location. They are currently pursuing land rights in the form of drainage easements from an adjoining property owner. Drabicki stated he is confident the violation will be resolved this summer and will continue to keep the committee updated.

During Tax/Planning & Zoning Chairman comments, Geiger suggested the committee consider employing alternative ZBA members to ensure a quorum at the ZBA hearings. Perkinson asked that Feller provide the committee with a list of townships without a ZBA member.

The committee revisited the Louis Creek Solar application. Griscom stated property owner information has been emailed to the Planning & Zoning Office and the application has been emailed to the Soil and Water Conservation District. Geiger, Feller, Keyt and Drabicki have been copied on these emails. It was moved by Chad McGinnis and seconded by Whitlow to approve the Louis Creek Solar application. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

There was no old business.

During new business, McCammon reported there is nothing set by the state at this time assessment wise for BESS.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by McGinnis and seconded by Huse to adjourn at 11:21 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote.

Your Committee met at the Administrative Center on June 5, 2025 at 10:05 A.M. Members present were County Board Chairman Paul Ducat, Donna Crow, Kathleen Perkinson, Charlie Alt and Jed Whitlow. Scott Watts and Doug Geiger were absent. Also present, Finance Manager Jill Johnson, County Clerk Brein Suver, Planning & Zoning Administrator Julie Feller, EMA Director Scott Anderson, IEDA Director Angel Crawford, Carl Gerdovich with WGFA, and County Board members Jamie Bakken and Mitchell Bence.

The meeting was called to order.

It was moved by Donna Crow and seconded by Jed Whitlow to approve the agenda. Motion carried by a voice vote.

There were no public comments.

EMA Director Scott Anderson distributed his monthly report to the committee.

- On May 13th, a semi hauling an oversized load rolled over by Iroquois Paving. The situation was mitigated many hours later with no significant spillage of either fuel or hydraulic fluid. The County received a dust storm warning on May 16th from the National Weather Service due to the extreme wind conditions. EMA monitored wind speeds and visibility issues at several locations within the County and reported findings to the NWS. A line of severe storms passed through the southern portion of the County on May 20th causing two tornado warnings to be issued by the NWS. The new siren warning procedures were not in place at the time resulting in sirens not being activated in the Buckley or Loda area following the first issued warning. After the second issued NWS warning that included Cissna Park, the sirens were not activated until Anderson instructed ICOM to activate them. No touchdowns were reported as well as no significant damage.

- Anderson continues to work on the redesign of the EOP. Final approval of this document is not due until the end of June 2026.
- Anderson has scheduled a joint training session to take place with the health department on July 22nd. This training will test administrative capabilities to sustain both short- and long-term funding of a health department emergency. Members of the health department administration, the County Finance department as well as the County Board Chairman and Vice-Chairman have been invited to participate. This training is required by IDPH and EMA will also get training credit for the drill.
- Despite delays in Washington with FEMA, Anderson said it appears they are still on track for a July completion.
- Anderson was informed of a grant opportunity made available thanks to the Hazard Mitigation Plan being completed. Monies are available for projects included within current plans but the timeframe to complete the application was extremely narrow. Anderson chose the warning siren installation at the fairgrounds as a project due to the simplistic nature of the planning process. Anderson has gathered the required information on the equipment and labor costs and the total should be approximately \$40,000. The grant pays 75%, the in-kind match would be 25% or approximately \$10,000. Anderson is seeking board approval for the in-kind portion of this project should the grant funding be provided. Anderson said he has not heard yet as to whether or not the fair board will be contributing to the cost of the project. The grant deadline is June 20th. It was moved by Crow and seconded by Whitlow to approve the expenditure of 25%, approximately \$10,000, for the purchase of an installation of a siren for the fairgrounds, pending additional information. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.
- The new warning systems policy has been completed with input from ETS Director Eric Raymond. The new procedures took effect on May 23rd and there should no longer be any delays in siren activation following issued warnings. On June 3rd during the monthly testing of the warning sirens throughout the County, a communications issue prevented all the sirens within the County from activating except for the Watseka sirens. Anderson was notified of the issue and Raymond was already in the process of researching the cause of the problem. Once the problem has been identified and rectified, Raymond will schedule a re-test of the system County-wide and Anderson will issue a press release making the public aware of the unscheduled test.
- EMA has purchased a high-end Davis weather station. It has been installed and is currently providing continuous weather data. The current location for the weather station will be modified as it was determined that the hot air generated from the HVAC system heat exchangers below the device was creating inaccurate temperature readings. EMA also purchased a professional level anemometer to accurately monitor and record wind speeds. This device was utilized to record the wind speeds during the high wind/dust warning event and passed the data along to the NWS. Anderson also purchased two DOT approved reflective coats that are rain and wind proof to allow staff to safely operate in the field.

- Anderson was unable to attend the Amateur Radio Club meeting on May 22nd. Anderson attended the MABAS meeting in Ashkum on May 28th. The weather station and the ability to access its data was discussed and well received. Anderson also spoke about the grant opportunity and the possibility of having early warnings at the fairgrounds was also well received.
- Anderson continues to share information on the EMA Facebook page. The data collected from the weather station is available on the County EMA web page and Facebook page.

Discussion was held on the weather alert policy. Anderson said the policy is in place and some changes may need to be made later. The committee also discussed the installation of the weather station. As stated in Anderson's report, the weather station will be relocated and no action is required.

The Committee Chairs gave their monthly reports:

- Management Chairman Kathleen Perkinson reported the Finance Committee discussed a deficiency with the anti-virus software with AreaWide. The software was approved and communicated to AreaWide. Discussion was held on County Engineer Alan Harwood's salary. Veterans Assistance requested a \$45,000 loan to be paid back over three years. The committee approved this request. The committee received reports from the department heads and also discussed the hiring of a tenth telecommunicator. No action was taken.
- Perkinson reported the Tax/Planning & Zoning Committee received reports from the department heads. The committee discussed and approved a solar project application and discussed the Meteorological Tower application that was presented. The committee also received an update on the floodplain ordinance violation.
- Perkinson reported the Management Committee received a monthly report from Maintenance Supervisor Chris Drake and discussed capital improvement items for the upcoming budget. The committee also discussed the location of the weather station and the configuration of the board room.
- Judicial chairman Jed Whitlow reported the committee received their monthly reports from department heads and approved a resolution extending the audit for the Circuit Clerk.
- Highway Chairman Charlie Alt reported the committee opened and took action on a bid received for a bridge that was re-let. A special meeting is scheduled for June 26th at 9:00 A.M. Discussion was also held on bridges that have been selected for the IDOT Bridge Bundle. An update was given on Chapel Bridge.
- Health Chairman Donna Crow reported the Health committee received reports from Animal Control and the Iroquois County Public Health Department. Animal Control Administrator Angela Frary was introduced to the committee. Crow will be meeting with Frary after the board meeting on Tuesday to discuss Animal Control budget items. Animal Control is currently hiring for a kennel worker and a warden. Crow is reaching out to veterinarians. Finance Manager Jill Johnson will continue to assist Frary through November 30th. The committee also discussed capital improvement items for the Animal Control building and ways to bring in extra revenue.

Anderson provided a copy of the weather alert policy and will also email the policy to the committee. No action is needed.

Crow provided an update on rural transportation stating a meeting was held on May 16th with CRIS to review their services. County Board Chairman Paul Ducat and County Board member Jamie Bakken were also in attendance. Crow said the meeting was very informative and they learned that the providers, CRIS and ShowBus, are responsible for seeking contracts with businesses that utilize the services. At this time the only contract we have is with the Arc of Iroquois County. There is a survey available to us at no cost to determine our needs. PCOM Monte Andrews will be pursuing this. Crow said they also learned that CRIS is able to bill insurance, Medicare and Medicaid for the use of services. CRIS has 22 buses and 4 vans. They serve Vermilion County six days a week from 8 A.M. until 4 P.M. Another meeting was held May 20th. County Board member Jamie Bakken provided an update as Crow was unable to attend. Contracts were brought to the meeting for Livingston County and CRIS and Livingston County and ShowBus. During the meeting, it was noted that ShowBus is no longer willing to service Iroquois County. Alina Hartley with Livingston County is working on a three-month or possibly a six-month agreement for the transition period. CRIS has said they are willing to step up and service Iroquois County. It was stated that ShowBus appears to not be willing to grow with the times and their lack of cooperation has made them difficult to work with. PCOM Monte Andrews will be attending the County Board meeting Tuesday. Crow noted the minutes from the May 20th meeting are available for review.

County Clerk Breein Suver provided a list of liquor licenses to be approved by the committee. Suver noted there are two raffle and poker run licenses being applied for. It was moved by Alt and seconded by Perkinson to approve the annual liquor licenses. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

Appointments will be made at the County Board meeting.

Correspondence was distributed to the committee for review.

The committee reviewed the claims. It was moved by Whitlow and seconded by Perkinson to pay the claims, subject to County Board approval. A roll call vote was taken. Motion carried.

During old business, Perkinson discussed the peace meal program through OSF and stated it appears a very successful new program has been implemented at Cindy's Roadside Café in Buckley starting yesterday.

During new business, Crow discussed the matter of hiring an additional telecommunicator. Crow stated that there are many families in the area that have a history of working with EMS, Fire Departments and other emergency services. The job vacancies are advertised appropriately but perhaps we could use our resources and recruit from these departments and families to establish long-term employees.

As there was no further business to come before the committee, it was moved by Whitlow and seconded by Crow to adjourn the meeting at 11:42 A.M. Motion carried by a voice vote. All of which is respectfully submitted.
